## CONCERT WAS GREAT SUCCESS

Symphony Orchestra Played Well at Theatre Last Night But Attendance was Slim.

The symphony orchestra concert given last night in the Westholme Theatre was a great success so far as the quality of the entertainment was concerned although the attendance was not anything like as large as might have been expected.

The orchestra of over twenty pieces conducted by H. Aubrey Pryce played really well, the renderings of some of the selections from the classics being excellent. Possibly the poorest work was done on the selection they were expected to know best, the Anvil Chorus from H. Trovatore.

An orchestral number, "The Slippery Horn," in which S. Steele on the trombone took a leading part, was especially well enjoyed. The solo strains of the instrument combined with the following in of the entire orchestra proved both odd and entertaining.

The Government is without authority from the people of this country to conduct its affairs, and stands as a usurper of their political rights even in the eyes of multitudes of those who helped to return to power the previous administration."

## MYSTERY HOUSE IS EXPLORED

Authorities Find Secret Chambers in Home of Former Rebel.

There proves to be a romantic story behind the announcement that Collenswood House, Terenure, Dublin, had been partly destroyed by Crown forces with crowbars, picks and saws. An official statement shows remarkable discoveries made by the authorities about the structure of the building.

The house, which was formerly known as St. Enda's College, was occupied some years ago by Patrick Pearse, who was executed after the Dublin rebellion. A recent search by the authorities disclosed several suspicious and apparently unnecessary alterations that had been recently made on the instructions of leading rebels. It was therefore decided to ascertain the reason for the alterations.

**False Walls**  
Minute searches resulted in the discovery that the changes were in the nature of false walls and false doors, and there was a false wardrobe with a secret spring which opened a chamber which appeared to be used as an office. In one of the rooms secret doors and secret cupboards were found. There were nine exits from the house, giving access to adjacent fields.

**Illegal Association**  
During investigations a revolver and some ammunition were found in one of the dummy walls. Previous raids showed that the premises had been used to carry out the objects of an illegal association. There was nobody on the premises yesterday when the raid was made.
