## VICTORY FOR ENGLISH AMATEUR BOXERS OVER AMERICANS AT NEW YORK

### May Be Dominion Election If Liberal Unionists Bolt

Possibility of Meighen Appealing to Country During Coming Spring; Efforts to Split Quebec; Afraid of Western Preponderance

OTTAWA, January 18.—(Special)—Great interest is being seen in the preparations for the opening of the sessions of Parliament here on February 14. There is a rumor going around hotels and clubs to the effect that there may be a number of Liberal Unionists bolt from the present Government during the coming session, although on what particular pretext is not known, less it be that Meighen is a rabid Conservative and is making effort to conciliate the Liberals who have been supporting the government since the war cabinet was formed.

Among those mentioned as possible bolters are several westerners, and it is quite possible that some sensations may be sprung before the spring is far advanced and it may even mean an early election.

#### Election in Spring.

The opinion is expressed in some quarters that Mr. Meighen may try to force an election in the spring. While the census taking and the need of a redistribution of seats seems necessary and would give the present Government a good excuse for hanging on, it is pointed out by those who should be in a position to know, that the Meighen Government is afraid of the west and to give the west additional representation before an election would simply mean playing into the hands of the enemy.

A redistribution based on the 63 members for Quebec, which is the basis of all Canadian representation under the British North America Act, will mean a lessening of the representation of the maritime provinces, and this will tend to put the blue nosed against the government, which reduces their number of members.

#### To Split Quebec.

There is every evidence to show that the Government manipulators are doing their level best to split Quebec. That province is essentially Tory and the people are not free traders. The inhabitant has little sympathy with modern movements. For other reasons, largely sentimental, the people have supported Liberalism.

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Four British Amateurs Outbox Four Americans

Great Triumph for Englishmen at International Sporting Club, New York, Last Night; Brown Scores Knockout

NEW YORK, January 18.—English amateur boxers triumphed over their American opponents last night in all four bouts staged by the International Sporting Club.

A knockout victory was scored by Hugh Brown, amateur middleweight champion of England and of the British army, in the second round over Ben Davis, Indian light heavyweight champion of the United States.

Army Capt. E. V. Chandler, amateur heavyweight champion of England and the British Army, won from John Cartwright, champion of the United States army, by 33 points to 29.

John Watson, British navy champion heavyweight, defeated Ralph Ritchie, United States navy champion, by 31 to 28.

Harry Mallon, middleweight title holder of the London police, outpointed John Suff of the New York police, welterweight titleholder.

### HALIBUT ARE MOVING SOUTH

Number of Smaller Boats Left Here in Last Ten Days to Fish West of Queen Charlottes.

The slack fishing season will soon be over now that the fish are commencing to move southward. During the past ten days several smaller vessels have left this port to fish on the whale banks on the west coast of Frederick Island off the Queen Charlottes. With fine weather, such has been prevailing during the past day or so, these boats should be soon in with their first spring catch.

While there are still some of the large schooners fishing to the westward on the Yakatia banks, many are now undergoing overhaul in Seattle. When they are again in shape for the season's work, they will go no direct west but will fish off Cape Flattery and Destruction Island and work off the west coast of Vancouver Island.

The movements of the boats now mark the commencement of the spring season. Both large and small boats will again be coming here in large numbers.

### PAYING HIGH BUTTER PRICE

British Food Ministry Offers 300 Shillings per Hundredweight Canadian Product.

OTTAWA, Jan. 18.—The agent of the British Food Ministry has been authorized to purchase first quality Canadian butter at a price equivalent to three hundred shillings per hundredweight. This will be the highest price ever paid by the ministry for butter supplies.

### 'LL BUT COASTS IN ZERO'S GRIP, SAYS TORONTO REPORT

TORONTO, Jan. 18.—All Canada with the exception of the Pacific and Atlantic coasts is apparently in the grip of zero weather. The lowest temperatures officially recorded this morning are at Ottawa, where it is 18 below zero, and at Winnipeg where the thermometers registered 20 below. Unofficial reports give Iroquois Falls 40 below and Cochrane, Ontario, 28 below.

### LOGGER KILLED

Axel Johnson of Ocean Falls is Drowned in Fitzhugh Sound.

OCEAN FALLS, Jan. 18.—Axel Johnson, a hand logger, was drowned in Fitzhugh Sound on Thursday last. He fell into the water from a log and was unable to get out.

### New York Fur Sales Show Fifty Per Cent. Price Drop

Sealskins, Dressed and Dyed, Marketed in States for First Time Today; Brisk Bidding in Some Lines

NEW YORK, January 18.—Large decline in fur prices over those obtained a year ago were shown at the fur auction here, which is resumed after an interval of nine months. An average of fifty per cent decline seems to be shown, yet this is not lower than the current market of other years. It is a drop back to normal. This is the annual sale and is held under the auspices of the Auction Sales Corporation.

Since the last previous sale was held here in April, prices of furs, in keeping with all other kinds of merchandise, have undergone sharp reductions. Most of the prices obtained today, however, either equalled or exceeded the current market. Bidding for marten and fisher was the feature of the day with beaver and muskrat selling well.

Dressed and dyed sealskins were sold here today for the first time and brought good prices. Formerly these have all been marketed in London.

VICTORIA, Jan. 18.—A rumor has been going the rounds here to the effect that the government was considering making the drugists of the province the distributors of liquor. Joseph Emery, registrar of the Pharmaceutical Association of B. C., said the drugists had made no arrangement to meet Premier Oliver and the cabinet in connection with the reported proposals to let them take over the distribution under the new act. The drugists had not changed their official stand and did not want to handle the business.

### SURPRISED PARTY PREPARING AMBUSH IN COUNTY CORK

LONDON, Jan. 18.—Six men were arrested in an attempt to set fire to the Vacuum Oil Co.'s plant at Wandsworth on Saturday. The police believe they have captured the virtual leader of the so-called Sinn Fein terrorist gang in London. They have found papers indicating the connection of the arrested men with the Sinn Fein movement.

### Stole Over \$8,000 Worth of Diamonds

Burglars Entered Vancouver Store when place was brilliantly lighted and hundreds of people were passing

VANCOUVER, January 18.—While hundreds of people were passing last night and the place was brilliantly lighted, robbers entered the jewelry store of H. Maxwell, Hastings Street, by cutting through the partition from the adjoining store. They made a successful getaway with 167 diamond rings valued at more than \$8,000.

This is one of the most daring robberies perpetrated in this city. It seems to have been carefully planned and the wonder is that burglars were able to carry out their work without being detected.

### PILE DRIVING GOING SWIFTLY

CLOVERDALE, Jan. 18.—Nomination day in the Delta by-election is to be January 29, and polling will take place February 3. This will allow time for the returns to be in so that the member elected may take his seat at the opening of the House.

### Garrigan New Manager of Wha'en Pulp and Paper Co.

N. J. Foley in Charge at Swanson Bay; Efforts to Operate All Plants to Capacity

VANCOUVER, January 18.—(Special).—U. M. Waite, vice-president of the Wha'en Pulp and Paper Co., Ltd., announced this morning that S. H. Garrigan had been appointed manager on this coast, succeeding Sir George Bury.

Mr. Garrigan is to have charge of all departments excepting the treasury, which Mr. McMaster retains. Mr. Garrigan knows the sulphite business thoroughly, having been engaged in production since the age of fifteen, when he started as a mill hand. He has worked his own way up to the top. He was several years with the International Paper Company as superintendent and latterly with the Reliance Paper Board, of Lockport, New York State.

Mr. Waite is unable at present to outline the new firm's policy but all efforts will be concentrated upon obtaining a capacity output from the different plants controlled by the company.

N. J. Foley has been appointed superintendent of the plant at Port Alice. The superintendence of the Swanson Bay plant is as yet unfilled.
