PROCEEDING WITH WORK

Many Visitors are Pleased With Jessie Mine Near Smithers

SMITHERS, Sept. 9.—There were many visitors to the Jessie Mine during the past week and all who were making the visit for the first time could not help but remark on how convenient to transportation the location of the mine is and how easy it is to reach the property.

Among those inspecting the mine in the past few days have been Charles Graham, the inspector of metalliferous mines, and Douglas Lay, government engineer for the north-eastern district. It is also expected that W. G. Norrie-Leowenthal, the company's consulting engineer, will make a further examination of the workings during the month of September.

In the present tunnel work, good progress is being made. The tunnel has failed to discover any limit to the wide mineralized zone in which it is being run. This is at a horizon 400 feet below the apex of the vein system and depth is being gained rapidly as the tunnel is pushed ahead. It is now being continued as a drift on a strong band of ore in this mineralized zone. Cross-cuts will be run from this drift at regular intervals.

Jessie Mine ore was awarded first prize in its class at the Vancouver Exhibition last week. This is by no means the only prize that has been won by ores from this property as several times in the past awards have been made to it at the Prince Rupert Exhibition.

The new log bunk-house on the property has now been completed and is in use. It affords comfortable accommodation for eight men and is one of the best-built camps in the mountains near Smithers.

Well Known Local Couple Married in Vancouver Lately

Following their recent marriage in Vancouver, Duncan MacKenzie and his bride, formerly Mrs. Alice Green, both well known and popular residents of many years' standing in Prince Rupert, are expected to arrive in the city in the course of the next week or so to take up residence. They were married on August 29 at the home in Vancouver of the officiating clergyman by Rev. J. R. Frizell, a former pastor of First Presbyterian Church here. They are at present honeymooning in Seattle and other southern cities.

BARDS IN MEETING

Town in Cornwall Will be Assembly Place

TRURO, England, Sept. 9.—Truro, county town of Cornwall, is the meeting place of men of Celtic descent and students of Celtic history and legend from Sept. 6 to 10 at this Celtic Congress. Cornishmen greet and talk with Bretons from Brittany and Welshmen from Wales. Old songs are sung at a Celtic concert.

Appropriately, the Gorsedd or Assembly of the Bards will be held during the meeting of the Congress today. This is a festival of poetry and music similar to the Elsteddod of Wales. The "Merry Maidens," a famous circle of stones in Buryan Parish near Penzance, has been chosen as the gathering place of the Bards. Members of the Celtic Congress will attend.

Around the "Dawns-Maen," or Dancing Stones, as the "Merry Maidens" were called in the ancient Cornish tongue, the fable will once more be told. Onlookers will say that these were maidens who danced on the Sabbath and were turned to stone, with their attendant pipers represented by two adjacent Men-hir on Long-stones. Antiquarians will reply that the story is a Christian fable imposed upon a pre-historic monument, for the stone circle dates back far beyond the era when dancing on Sunday became a crime and is more probably associated with early pagan rites and ceremonies.

Straightening Out Woodbine

Meeting of Creditors of Portland Canal Mining Company is Held in Vancouver

An order having been granted by the courts to G. L. Fraser, representing the custodian of the Woodbine Gold Mining Co. FINE FILM PRESENTED

"Bring 'Em Back Alive" is Great Animal Picture Taken in Malayan Straits Jungle

"Bring 'Em Back Alive," which is the feature offering on the screen of the Capitol Theatre here this week-end, is heralded as the most remarkable animal picture which has been produced to date and that is saying a good deal for there have been many fine ones.

In this picture, which was made on a Van Buren expedition to the Federated Malay States, are animal episodes which are said to have no parallel either in still or motion picture photography. These episodes include a battle between an enraged water buffalo and a tiger, the capture of a rare monitor lizard and the battle between a crocodile and a black panther. Then, as a major episode of this most unusual film, comes the attack of a tiger upon a 30-foot regal python, a battle which lasts many minutes and which is declared to be the most thrilling of its kind that has ever been photographed.

Every foot of "Bring 'Em Back Alive" was made in the Malayan jungle country and every foot is genuine. Many rare animals crossed the path of the camera and were recorded.

The expedition on which the picture was made was led by Frank Buck, the celebrated animal catcher who has made a life work of going into the jungles of Asia and Africa and bringing back, alive, animals for the zoos and circuses of America. Last year his book "Bring 'Em Back Alive" was a best seller for months and directed much attention to Mr. Buck and his work.

"Bring 'Em Back Alive" is, indeed, a drama of the wilds with real wild beasts for the cast. It is an educational picture which is highly recommended by all who have seen it. Incidentally, it was only three weeks ago that it had its initial showing in Vancouver and other big cities.
