Importance of
Dominions' Conference.

The Imperial Conference of Prime Ministers of the British Dominions which commenced yesterday in London will be one of the most important meetings, as far as the British Empire is concerned, that has taken place since the Great War. Many problems of vital interest to the Empire will be discussed and the results of the conference will reflect in the future policies of the Imperial government as well as those of the autonomous dominions. At the gathering the viewpoints of the various outposts of the Empire will be set out and a better common understanding between all will be formed. The conference has not been called to consider constitutional changes but merely to deal with questions that are facing each and all of the different parts of the Empire in a common sense. Among questions will be the matter of naval defence of the Empire, the Anglo-Japanese alliance and its relation to other friendly nations and other matters of foreign policy.

Greater Unity
Will be Result.

It is not to be expected that Great Britain, Canada, Australia, New Zealand and South Africa will see eye to eye in every question. They will not and that is one reason why the conference has been called. By personal representation and explanation each will be able to better learn the others' attitude and viewpoints on various intricate questions of common moment. The vast differences in geographical position that exist between the dominions will put very different lights on various questions. Compromises will have to be made on some points and it is with a view to making clear the necessity of these compromises that the conference is in session. By means of co-operation and mutual agreement it is likely that the bonds which tie these five great sections of the Empire together will be more strongly welded and they will all stand shoulder to shoulder with a common front unanimous and agreed on questions that affect their common relationship with foreign countries.

British Empire and
Foreign Alliances.

To remain united in peace as they were united in war is the great object of the dominions at the present time. To attain this the sense of sectionalism and autonomy must for the present be submerged in the consideration of the relations of the Empire with outsiders. While the hostility of none should be incurred too great friendships at the same time should be avoided. It is not that Britain wants to stand aloof by doing this but it is for the reason that too much favor to one foreign power might result in the causing of ill-feeling with another. This point can be readily illustrated in the case of the Anglo-Japanese alliance. It is highly desirable that Britain remain friendly with Japan, but this should not be done at the expense of misunderstanding to the United States. After all Columbia, the daughter of Britannia, should be closer to the maternal heart and, from present indications, all the statesmen who take part in this great conference will keep that feeling in mind.

Constitutional Changes
Not Needed Now.

It has already been pointed out that the Conference of Premiers was not called to consider matters of constitution in the British Empire. This may come later—perhaps a year from now and perhaps not even then and, in any case, it is not a question of immediate import. The expression has been voiced at many times and in many parts of the Empire that there should be an Imperial council or some legal formula to hold the nation together. Those who give this matter prominence at the present time forget that the Empire has existed for centuries without these things. This is what Premier W. M. Hughes of Australia says in regard to persons who now favor the redrafting of the Empire's constitution: "In their desire to improve upon the British Empire these persons display complete ignorance of the geographical, ethnological and historical facts." If their advice were to be followed the Empire would most assuredly tumble to pieces. I think nothing is more certain than that the surest way of destroying this mighty empire would be to tamper with its constitution. The complete autonomy of its parts is the foundation upon which its unity rests. The basic principle underlying the relations between Britain and her overseas dominions is freedom of action."

Discussion of the report on the engineer department, the proposals for establishing a sewer system, and the burning question of the retaining walls will take place. There promises to be a long sitting and a lively time.

The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.
