**Showing How Pacific Milk Whips**



A whipped cream demonstration, showing how Pacific Milk whips, was given at the Fair. Yesterday we were asked for the recipe. Please follow details closely:

1. Have Pacific Milk cool.
2. Whip briskly two minutes.
3. Add fresh lemon juice freely and whip until cream is thick (about 3 or 4 minutes).
4. Fold in slowly 1 teaspoon, each separately, of granulated sugar and vanilla. Serve.

Be sure (1) to whip 2 minutes before adding lemon juice; (2) to use granulated sugar; (3) to fold in sugar and flavoring with spoon, not whipper.
