**Sport Chat**

Now that the baseball and football season is about over and clubs in this section are being disbanded for the year, it is a good time to review the work done by the different clubs and ascertain, if possible, ways and methods of improving sport. Football this season has been conducted on better lines than ever before. Indeed, the Football League's executive has had a pretty quiet time of it all the way through and there has been little in the way of disputes to be settled. In the baseball league the Elks and Sons of Canada provided good games. However, it is to be hoped that next year the best players will be better divided and that there will be more clubs in the running.

For the past few years the city has been steadily building up a good baseball club of local boys. The proposition of bringing in outside players to strengthen the team has been refused and this, at times, has presented difficulties. Baseball enthusiasts demand high class ball and some of them discourage the younger players and disgust the older. Prince Rupert, however, has been playing strictly local boys for some years and at the close of the season has one of the best ball teams in the province. She will start the 1932 season with a bunch of good home ball players and the organization, it is to be hoped, will be kept clearly amateur.

The consensus of opinion in local baseball circles, is, doubtless, in favor of the continuing of amateur ball as against the using of imported players. If the lead in this regard is taken here it will likely be followed by the other teams of the North, such as Anyox, Ocean Falls and Prince George. The latter team inclined to fall away in this respect this year but it will not be done next season if Prince Rupert, Anyox and Ocean Falls join up with the B. C. Amateur Associations. With the four towns thus lined there would be excellent opportunity for some splendid inter-city games next year and the possible formation of a northern league.

**ASKS FOR STRICTER LAW ENFORCEMENT REGARDING LIQUOR**

EDMONTON, Sept. 23.—Stricter enforcement of the liquor laws with less whiskey in circulation by underground routes, would result in less likelihood of a bread line and unemployment trouble, in general this coming winter, it was claimed by H. H. Hull, secretary of the Alberta Social Service council, in an interview with Premier Greenfield and Attorney-General Brownlee.

Mr. Hull said that there was a strong sentiment among the people who had given the majority vote for prohibition that the law should be better enforced and that a move in that direction by the new government was being anxiously awaited. He offered a number of suggestions as to how the desired end might be reached, and the government's consideration to these was promised by the two ministers, who stated that their present policy with regard to the liquor question was to gather full information before making a further move.

**MANNEQUINS ARE IN DEMAND AT CENTRES OF CANADIAN FASHION**

MONTREAL, Sept. 23.—The fall season for Montreal and other centres of Canadian fashion is rapidly advancing and department and the specialty shops are busy preparing for the fall opening exhibition. This season, more than ever before, new gorgeous effects in gowns, suits, cloaks and hats are seen, imported models in daring combinations being shown to delight the feminine eye and the store managers are making arrangements to secure mannequins whose figure and general appearance will show their goods off to the best possible advantage. The number of models required is in proportion to the fashionable clientele the store enjoys, a shop in the east district requiring about ten models while an exclusive ladies' wear, high-price shop on St. Catherine Street West might require twice that number so that its display might be more effective.

**Living Models.**

There is something similar in the stage set for a display of gowns by living models and the stage set for theatrical presentation. Each requires that its actors have a certain amount of training and also a good appearance. Young women make a specialty of the former work, training for the most part, in the fitting-room of manufacturers. A girl is not born to the "mannequin manner" although she may be born with a pretty
