The regular monthly meeting of the Hospital Board was held last night in the council chamber. There were present President D. G. Stewart, Directors E. H. McRae, Ald. J. H. Kelly, E. H. Mortimer, J. C. McLennan, Mrs. D. W. Morrissey and Major Gibson, secretary.

A letter from the Canadian Steam Laundry protesting the method of awarding the contract for the hospital laundry was read at the meeting of the hospital board last night. As the contract had been awarded already the board felt that the matter had been closed so the letter was filed.

On behalf of the Ladies' Auxiliary of the Hospital Board, Mrs. D. W. Morrissey last night asked that the payment of the \$500 loan for laboratory purposes by the board be made. Major Gibson, secretary, stated that the money was available and the check would be made out immediately.

GERMANY BUYS SHIPS

Complications are expected to arise in the United Kingdom over the decision of the British Government to permit foreign countries, including ex-enemy, to bid for ex-German tonnage. Sale of secondhand British ships to foreigners is restricted to vessels not less than 15 years old, while five years must elapse before shipowners are allowed to have their acquired ex-enemy vessels transferred to a foreign flag.

Opinion in England is divided on the wisdom of letting down the bars. Some contend that as British buyers have absorbed all the enemy tonnage they can, or will, there is no logic in refusing foreigners the privilege of bidding. Others regard the change in policy as an aid to Germany in restoring her maritime trade.
