Modern business men, recalling personal experiences, may be inclined to scoff at this statement, but it is none the less true. A business aggregating many millions of dollars annually is transacted by five office employees. This condition, presumably, is a survival of that form of efficiency for which that enigmatic, taciturn genius, the late Sir William Macdonald, was distinguished. No Telephones.

INCOME TAX COLLECTION

Twelve Hundred Returns Made Here—As High as \$2,000 Assessments.

A sure sign of the general prosperity that prevails in the city is the fact that 1,200 income tax returns were filed at the office of G. L. Monroe, the local collector.

The payments of taxes made ranged from 10¢ to over \$2,000, these representing the total payments. There were a good number ranging between \$600 and \$1,000 and quite a few between \$1,000 and \$2,000. The opinion that only the small earner was paying the tax is thus refuted.

The Dominion government is now taking steps to check up the individual returns and every available source of information is being combed over. It is stated that the chance of escaping the tax this year is very slim. From now on any delayed returns made are subject to an extra assessment of 25 per cent of the tax or a minimum of 85¢.

Mr. Monroe and his assistant, J. Slade Stevens, found many peculiarities in the returns and inquiries made and in some cases they were called upon to work out some rather delicate intricacies in incomplete returns.

Some Incidents.

On the last day when the office was closed and when there were 20 to 30 people waiting, one man came in and asked to see the statue where provision was made that a man must pay tax on earnings outside of Canada. This man was particularly obstinate and wished to argue the point so he was firmly but politely asked to wait until the office was cleared. Then after some time he was dealt with and left the office much subdued.

Another case was that of a married man who had earned \$2,900 in the year but had paid hospital and medical fees of \$950. He very persistently demanded exemption and needed a good deal of persuasion before he could be shown that the statutes did not provide for such an exigency.

Loss for Year.

Still another incident was that in the case of a man who was known to be a bootlegger. Asked as to revenue from "other sources" than those stated, he replied: "You don't expect a man to make a return for money he stole, do you?" One person wished to be listed as a professional gambler showing a loss for the year.
