Manitoba Has Prescription Trouble.

Manitoba is afflicted with the same prescription disease that once afflicted the people of British Columbia. The doctors of that province have been selling permits to drink under the name of prescriptions. They have proved themselves just as human as the bootleggers and indeed on exactly the same plane. Doctors are privileged people. They have an organization that is supposed to be self-disciplinary. They are men who are trusted more than any other class in the community. The reputation of men and the honor of women is placed in their keeping and it is seldom confidences are broken or advantage is taken of the privileges. Here is a case, however, in Manitoba, as it was recently in British Columbia, where the doctors have fallen down on the job. They have succumbed to temptation and been carried away by the desire for gain. They have been issuing prescriptions wholesale on the prairies, just as they did some time ago in British Columbia. It is a pity the profession should have been degraded by the action of its members.

Archbishop Du Vernet on The Mental Kingdom.

Science has much to teach us about the Inorganic Kingdom which deals with dead things, and also about the Organic Kingdom which deals with living creatures, but there is a third realm, partly within and partly without what we commonly call the Organic Kingdom, which, because of its intrinsic value, should be given a name by itself. This is the Mental Kingdom. In the Mental Kingdom is included not only all thought, but also all emotion and all volition and especially all consciousness. This is the Psychic World.

As there are laws which regulate the structure of a crystal, the growth of a plant; the development of an animal, so there are laws which regulate the operation of the mind. This is true whether it be the Human Mind or the Divine Mind.

Psychic Research.

Philosophers have for centuries past been studying the Human Mind, but it is only within the last fifty years that special attention has been given to this subject with the aid of new scientific methods. For example, the mental and psychic experiences of all kinds of people under all conditions have been closely studied. This has opened up a new world most helpful in the work of educating the young. We know now how the mind of a child works at various ages, such as five, seven, fourteen, etc. The psychic experiences of old people just on the Border Land, with visions into the Great Beyond, have been studied. The mental experiences of both sane and insane people have been compared, the abnormal throwing a flood of light upon the normal. The mental experiences of people fully conscious, half-conscious, and apparently unconscious have been examined and related. The psychic experiences of people in natural sleep and in hypnotic trance have been scrutinized as with a microscope.

All these mental and psychic experiences have been collected, analyzed, and classified, giving us the Science of the Soul, so that we can speak with a certainty unknown fifty years ago of the laws of the Human Mind.

All Minds Connected.

If we are accustomed to call the laws of the Organic and the Inorganic Kingdoms the Laws of God, because God is back of all the forces of nature in a far higher sense the laws of the Human Mind are the laws of God, because our human minds are shining rays of the Divine Mind, and our individual personalities are living branches of the Universal Personality of God. It follows, therefore, of necessity that, if the Spirit of God is to have an influence over our hearts and lives, this influence must operate in accordance with the laws of the Human Mind.

Application To Religion.

There are those who never concentrate their attention on the Infinite, never open their minds to a Divine suggestion, never yield their hearts to a Higher Fellowship, and yet they wonder why they can not know God and why religion to them is only a conventional formality. God does not work upon us as an external mechanical force. He works in us as an internal spiritual influence in accordance with psychological laws. Spirit with spirit meets in the Psychic World not in helpless confusion but in the harmony of a Universal System.

GOVERNOR'S RECEPTION

Military Secretary Issues Rules Giving Order of Precedence

Prior to the Drawingroom reception held by the Governor General in the Senate Chamber at Ottawa the following regulations as to order of precedence was issued by the military secretary:
 Presentation will take place in the following order:—

(a) Cabinet Ministers and those gentlemen having the private entree, with their wives, unmarried daughters and unmarried sisters.

(b) Senators, the Speaker of the House of Commons, Puisne Judges of the Supreme Court, the Judge of the Exchequer Court, Puisne Judges of the Courts of Law and Equity, Retired Judges, Officials having seats on the floor of the Senate and the wives, unmarried daughters and unmarried sisters of the above, and the wives, unmarried daughters and unmarried sisters of the Hon. Aide-de-Camp.

(c) Members of the House of Commons, Officials having seats on the floor of the House with their wives, unmarried daughters and unmarried sisters.

(d) Members of the Executive Council and the Speaker and Members of the Legislative Assemblies, Deputy Ministers, the Commissioners of the Railway Commission, the Chairman of the International Joint Commission, the General Consulting Engineer to the Dominion Government, the Vice-General, the Sheriff of the County of Carleton, the Mayor of Ottawa, Consuls General and the wives, unmarried daughters and unmarried sisters of the above.

(e) The other Ladies and Gentlemen attending the Drawing Room.

Must Pass Throne
 Any ladies and gentlemen who have been presented and are desirous of remaining until the Drawing Room is concluded, may take up their positions either on the steps at each side of the Senate Chamber as far as the available space permits, or else in the Galleries; but the privilege will be allowed to those persons only who have passed the Throne.

Ladies are expected to be in evening dress—veils, feathers and court trains will not be worn. Gentlemen will be in full or evening dress. They are requested to provide themselves with two cards, on which their name should be legibly written, one to be left at the door of the Senate Chamber and the other to be given to the Aide-de-Camp on duty.

Apply to Aide
 In the case of the ladies intending to be presented for the first time, it is requested that application be made, before the date of the Drawing Room, to the Aide-de-Camp in waiting at Government House, who will provide the special presentation cards to be used on the occasion.
