President Denning thanked the association for the honor which had been conferred upon him. He would do his best for the welfare of the association and hoped that he would receive full support from the officers and executive.

The resignation of J. M. Campbell as secretary was received and the appointment of a successor was left with the executive.

ALICE ARM MINE NEWS

Continuation of Work This Summer Brings Forth More Good Showings.

ALICE ARM, Oct. 6.—The past season has seen a continuation of mineral development work in the valleys and hills tributary to this town and several showings which have been uncovered have still further given proof of the wealth that lies in the district.

The Taylor Mining Co. are now working 12 or 14 men at the Dolly Varden mine. It is proposed to get out 3000 tons of ore from the new showing that was uncovered this year. The ore body measures about 100 by 20 feet and the mineral is similar to that in the older sections of the mine. It assays about 50 ounces in silver. The Dolly Varden Railway is not running now.

The Homestake Mining Co. is continuing operations on the property near the Dolly Varden.

Moose Mine.

Miles Donald and Don Morrison have spent the summer doing development work on the Moose Mine which is four miles beyond the Dolly Varden on Trout Creek. They have driven 186 feet of tunnel on the lower level and 66 feet on the higher. The ore is similar to that of the Dolly Varden but contains more grey copper. They have been crosscutting to a width of 15 feet into mineral bearing quartz, picked samples of which have run 240 ounces in silver.

Copperfield Bonded.

William McLean has again bonded his David Copperfield mine, which is situated on the Dolly Varden Railroad just below the Dolly Varden itself.

John and Gus Strombeck are still working on the big showing they recently uncovered on the Torje. They do not expect to do much work during the winter.

Archie McPhail has driven 50 feet of cross-cut on the Last Chance mine which adjoins the Moose on Trout Creek.

In the Illiance River Valley, A. Hughes still is working two or three men on the Bellevue group.

SPECULATION RAMPANT IN RUSSIA'S CAPITAL

Shoe String Operators and Promoters Never So Numerous.

MOSCOW, Oct. 3.—Speculation is rampant in the capital of Soviet Russia. Wall Street, St. Francis Xavier Street or any other financial district in the world has not half as many "shoe-string operators" as this ancient city of the czars. The curbs are crowded each day with promoters trying to organize "co-operative concerns" from tea houses to automobile factories and the talk of money inside and outside the government has a capitalistic ring seldom heard in Russia before the Soviet government decided it was unable to handle all business.

Licenses for 897 shops and 5,482 market stalls or street wagons have been issued in Moscow since the opening of free trade. Market stalls pay from 1,000,000 to 1,500,000 rubles annually, according to location; bootblack's pay 300,000 rubles for their places of business, while shops pay 500,000 to 1,500,000 according to location and the proprietors must also keep the property in repair and clean the court yards and streets abutting their buildings. The government levies a tax of five per cent. in kind on concessionaires producing foodstuffs; eight per cent on chemical manufacturers and ten per cent on metal working firms. Twenty-six Moscow factories have been leased to private individuals out of 254 which the government has offered to concessionaires. These plants employ 1,700 men. The government has retained 315 factories employing 150,000 workers but it has assumed responsibility for feeding only 70,000. The industries retained are chiefly chemical, textile, metal, tanning, electrical and printing shops.

PASTOR'S FEE IS KISS; BUXOM BRIDE IS NEGRO

VANCOUVER, Oct. 4.—After completing the ceremony that linked Mr. and Mrs. Duncan F. Gates in wedlock, the groom apologetically presented the Rev. Vail-Stewart with one dollar with the explanation that they ran away from Seattle without much money. The buxom bride, however, did her "bit" by impressing a resounding kiss upon the cheek of the clergyman with the remark: "I'll sure never forget this kindness." The newlyweds were colored.

NEW SECT IN B.C.

VANCOUVER, Oct. 6.—Members of the Tongues of Living Fire, a strange sect, have acquired land in the Fraser Valley for colonizing. Eight families are on their way from Michigan. They are vegetarians, believe only in the Holy Spirit, have an aversion to cutting their hair or shaving, and practice vigorous penance for the sins of the unsaved.
