## Allies to Enforce Terms of Treaty

### ORE ASSAYING FIVE TO TEN DOLLARS A POUND TAKEN FROM PREMIER MINE

#### Fifteen Year Old Irish Girl Clad in Armor Tried at Cork as Found with Arms in Her Possession Contrary to Law; Dropped Lewis Machine Gun as She Fleed

CORK, January 26.—Mary Bowles, a fifteen year old girl, was tried by court martial yesterday but sentence was deferred. She was arrested after being discovered crossing a field with arms in her possession, and having dropped a Lewis gun during her flight from the police. The girl was found to be wearing steel body armor. She refused to plead when arraigned before the court, remaining silent throughout the trial.

#### FREE GOLD IN SILVER AT PREMIER

New Strike of Ore Assaying  
Five to Ten Dollars  
a Pound.

STEWART, Jan. 26.—A narrow vein of marvellously rich ore has been struck at the Premier mine. It runs through the high-grade silver ore and assays from five to ten dollars a pound, or, if in sufficient quantities would go \$15,000 to \$20,000 to the ton. Just how much of this ore is to be found has not been proved. It may be a pocket or a continuous vein. It shows now as a narrow vein, an inch or two in thickness. The richness of the new strike consists in the free gold found among the silver. It is something which has set all tongues wagging and has enthused the prospectors who will be keener than ever to try to find a mine that will rival the Premier.

#### Doctor's Mistake Caused Death of Toronto Woman

Gave Wrong Medicine in Case of Blood Treatment;  
Guilty of Gross Carelessness, says Jury—  
Investigating

TORONTO, January 26.—A jury is investigating the deaths of Miss Monia Kennedy and Mrs. Emma Bond, who died in Dr. J. H. McConnell's office on January 8 after receiving blood treatment. It was found that Dr. Faed had been guilty of gross carelessness in regard to the matter. It is believed he had received neodiarsenol from Dr. A. Broday and that Broday gave Faed diarsenol instead of what he asked for. A possible result of the error was that the women died.

#### PERRY GOES TO PORT SIMPSON TO DISPENSE RELIEF TO DISTRESSED

Indian Agent G. C. Perry left this morning for Port Simpson to look after relief for the distressed teachers and pupils as a result of the destruction of the "Crosby girls" home yesterday morning. Tomorrow one of the teachers and ten girls will reach here to go south on the Prince George tomorrow night to Coqualeetza Institute. Mr. Perry, who is making the trip on the Wigwam, Captain Ketchum, will return tomorrow morning. Relief funds are being raised in the city in aid of the distressed school.

#### CHEAP POWDER FOR STUMPING

Premier Oliver Commits Government to Paying Third of Cost. ALDERGROVE, Jan. 26.—Premier Oliver in a speech here last night said the Provincial Government was alive to the necessity of increasing production and for that reason would set aside an appropriation at the coming session to pay one third of the cost of all stumping powder used for land clearing purposes. In discussing it, the Premier said that economically such a policy was indefensible but today they were dealing with conditions and not theories.

#### Germany to Disarm Before July 1 says Supreme Council

Must be Full Compliance with Treaty  
of Versailles, but Delay is Allowed  
in Carrying Out Provisions

PARIS, January 26.—The allied military experts have been handed the Supreme Allied report on the plan for disbandment of German military units. The reports give satisfaction to the French viewpoint on the question of providing for full compliance with all the disarmament clauses of the Versailles Treaty. The report also complies with Britain's view as to granting further delay. Two thirds of the disarmament is to be commenced March 1 and finished by July 1.

#### DE VALERA GOT INTO ENGLAND

Crossed Atlantic as Stoker and  
Was Refused Admittance  
Into Country.

NEW YORK, Jan. 26.—Philadelphia despatches indicate that De Valera sailed from that city on Thanksgiving Day on the British freighter Southwestern as a stoker under the name of Harold Merry. Photographs of De Valera were recognized by the ship's officers as Merry. He was refused admittance to England at London as an undesirable alien and deserted on December 10 or 11. He is now in England or Ireland, probably England.

#### GARDE RENEWS COPPER RIVER COAL OPTION

Boring Operations to be Continued,  
License Fees Paid and  
5 per cent End of Year

Mr. Justice Morrison has approved the granting by the liquidator of the National Finance Limited of a \$500,000 option of A. C. Garde, mining engineer, of Vancouver, the agreement covering property in the Copper River district of Central British Columbia, says the Vancouver Province. It is a coal area, twenty square miles in extent and under lease from the Provincial Government. The National Finance is interested to the extent of 75 per cent. Previous options have been granted, one in February, 1914, for \$750,000 and another the following year for \$500,000, but the resources of the block, reputed rich in coal, are practically untouched. A diamond drill has been installed and part of the arrangement is that Mr. Garde must continue boring operations. He also has to pay the license fees and by the end of the year is required to complete payment of 5 per cent of the option price, or \$25,000. A. E. Bull appeared for the liquidator. In the event of the proposition proving a success a substantial dividend will be distributed among the creditors of the defunct company, although in view of present liabilities facing the National Finance of over a million dollars, a completed sale at the option price will not extricate the company from liquidation.

#### SHIPBUILDING MEN ARRIVED HERE TODAY

A. Wallace, C. Hastie, Capt. Logan, L. Brownlie and Bert Manthrop in Party.

H. A. Wallace, managing director of the Wallace Shipyards, Ltd., reached the city on the Prince George this morning to confer with officials regarding the repairs to the three vessels, Prince Albert, G. E. Foster and Andrew Kelly which are now on the pontoons in the dry dock and also to make preliminary arrangements for the employment of men at the local shipyard when the work of completion of the two government hulls is recommenced. Among other shipping men arriving today were C. Hastie, representing Lloyds' Underwriters; A. L. Brownlie, port engineer for the Canadian National steamers; Capt. Logan, agent of Lloyds' and the London Salvage Corporation; and Bert Manthrop, government inspector of hulls and boilers.

#### TURKEY IS TO MEET GREECE

Effort to be Made by Supreme Council to Settle Near East Question.

PARIS, Jan. 26.—The Supreme Council has decided to call a conference of the allied representatives with representatives of Greece and Turkey at London at an early date to make an effort to settle the near east question. The idea is to prevent fighting between Greece and Turkey and to insure that the Turks keep order within their own boundaries.

#### SCHOONER OLGA LONG STRUGGLE TO KEEP AFLOAT

Now Being Repaired at Cordova Before Again Making Attempt. SCHOONER OLGA, Alaska, Jan. 26.—The schooner Olga, 51 days from Unalaska on a voyage to Seattle which was given up as hopeless here today after a battle with almost continuous gales in the North Pacific. Provisions gave out and the crew was forced to subsist on fish. The vessel was leaking badly and the pumps were kept working day and night yet she was barely afloat when she arrived here. It took several weeks to make repairs and fit her for the voyage to Seattle.

#### ALPIS JUMPED BACK OVER SIX FEET

#### RIGHT FIGHT IN DELTA CONSTITUENCY

#### IMPORTS ARE SLIGHTLY IN EXCESS OF EXPORTS

Total Trade Figures for the Year Over Two and Half Billion.

OTTAWA, Jan. 28.—Canada's foreign trade for twelve months, which ended December 31, totalled \$2,639,726,135. Of this amount \$1,336,921,021 constituted the imports of the country while the exports were valued at \$1,302,805,114. It will be noticed that the balance of trade is very close, a most desirable condition of affairs which should help materially to stabilize the exchange rates.

#### BOWSER REPEATS CHARGE AGAINST THE OLIVER GOVERNMENT

VANCOUVER, Jan. 26.—In a speech at the annual meeting of the Conservative Association, W. J. Bowser, leader of the party, repeated the charge that the Oliver Government had formed a pact with the underworld at the last election; adding that he had documents to prove the assertion.

#### ALBERTA COAL OUTPUT LARGE

Increased Export to British Columbia Mentioned in Annual Report.

EDMONTON, January 26.—The largest output of coal in the history of the province is the record of the Alberta mines for the past year, as announced by John T. Stirling, of the government mines branch. The figures for the twelve months will total about 6,650,000 tons, as compared with 5,022,412 tons for the preceding year. Final returns are not yet in from all the mines for the month of December, but it is known that the total production will be approximately as stated and will probably somewhat exceed those figures.

A marked increase in the shipments of Alberta coal to both the eastern and western markets was the outstanding feature of the year's business. To Manitoba there went 546,198 tons of domestic and steam coal, with an additional 1461 tons of anthracite as against a total of 341,290 tons in 1919. The British Columbia market took 198,139 tons of domestic and steam coal, a gain of nearly 20,000 tons over the preceding year.

#### PRE-WAR DISPLAY

Opening of Parliament This Year Will Be Largely a Social Event.

OTTAWA, Jan. 26.—The opening of Parliament on February 11 will be marked by all the old time display. It will be very largely a social function and invitations to a seat on the floor of the House will be very much at a premium.
