EDMONTON SPEECH OF W. L. MACKENZIE KING ON GREAT ISSUES OF THE CAMPAIGN

 the nation, in order to meet the burden of taxation. Commerce must be encouraged, and even Premier Meighen in his first declaration to parliament announced in favor of a lower revision of the tariff, yet found his impossible to deal with in parliament because of the power of the special interests and of the nature of his support in the house.

Able Counsellors Needed.
 Mr. King declared he stood squarely for the Liberal platform adopted at the great national convention at Ottawa, regarding this platform as a chart upon which to steer the Liberal ship of state. No one man could hope to guide through these rough seas entirely alone by the weight of his own wisdom. There must be able counsellors sought to aid any prime minister and the dictates of the people must be followed. The tariff was simply a wall, which is built high enough would keep out goods and protect those behind. However, it could be made low enough to permit goods coming in and yet give sufficient protection. Tariff for revenue only should be the object. The Liberal party was pledged first to reduce the duty on implements of production to the lowest possible degree and second to lower the scale of tariff on necessities of life as far as possible. Liberals stood against tariff for the interest of trust, combines and monopolies; theirs was a policy for the people of Canada as a whole.

In his closing words the Liberal chief appealed eloquently for unity amongst the forces fighting a common battle against the ranks of autocracy. It was a misfortune that Liberals, Farmers and Labor disagreed, but the things they had in common were vastly more important than the things over which they differed.
 "Because war made for waste let us seek for economy."
 "Because war made for autocracy let us try to get back to a real democracy."
 "Let us work for good will among men, faces, creeds, between provinces, between the east and the west, between the nations of the world and ourselves and between the other parts of the Empire and this Canada of ours."
 "By doing these things we will be furthering the great needs of humanity, and the empire in whose interests we are all so vitally concerned."
