Power Proposals

Investigated.

The superintendent of utilities has been under the instruction of the city council investigating the possibilities of increasing the power supply of the city by developing a tributary of the Shawatlans stream or by increasing the storage capacity of Woodworth Lake. In either case the cost is very great, approximately a quarter of a million dollars, and as soon as it is completed we should at once have to get busy on a bigger scheme, and eventually these small units would be scrapped.

Power is one of the essentials of success for a new city. We want as much as possible at as low a fate as possible. Already well are using the whole or nearly the whole of the present supply. The next slep is to get a bigger supply.

It is for engineers to advise where we shall get our supply, and the council is taking the right method in investigating all possible sources. The difficulty with that method is that the time of the superintendent is being taken up with this outside work almost ! continuously and it must be difficult for him to at the same time! keep the utilities running economically and efficiently and give them the proper oversight, . If there are to be investigations it would seem that they should be done in such a way as not to interfere with the organization of the other business.

The local untilities are a pretty large order for one man to superintend. There is a lot of work to it. Those of us who are running much smaller businesses know how close superintendence is needed in order to get the best results. At the same time, the work of investigation must go on so that the city may be in a position to keep pace with the demands that are made on her. One of these days we shall find ourselves without power. Even today it is doubtful if we can properly sell any more than is guaranteed.
