Private Use of National Credit.

Sir Henry Deayton stated in the House of Commons last Friday that Rumania has made no payment of interest on the loan from Canada, says the Montreal Star. The government placed 25 million dollars of national credit at the disposal of Rumania in the autumn of 1919. Similar amounts were also made available for Greece and Belgium.

The interest due from Rumania in October last amounted to over \$900,000. On April 1, 1921, the total interest due will be \$1,475,234. Of course, the interest is being paid, although the Rumanian traders or government are paying nothing. The Canadian people are paying it.

As the Canadian people furnished the loan, out of the national credit, it may seem peculiar that the Canadian people should also have to pay interest on it. But such transactions as the loan to Rumania furnish some interesting examples of this government's policy of placing national credit at the disposal of private interests.

The national credit is simply used as the security for issuing financial credit through the banks. Although the national credit is the basis of this financial credit, and it is issued for private use, the nation is made to agree to pay interest on it.

This is the Way It Works Out.

Traders in Rumania order Canadian goods and produce. The Canadian manufacturers and produce dealers are furnished with the financial credit from Canadian banks to pay wages and salaries, buy the raw materials and products and deliver the goods to Rumanian consumers.

The manufacturers and dealers are in turn paid out of the \$25,000,000 created by the Canadian government for the benefit, ostensibly, of Rumania. The manufacturers and dealers are thus enabled to pay off their indebtedness to the banks.

But, in spite of everybody having been paid, apparently, Canada remains in debt to the controllers of financial credit in New York or Montreal or wherever the issue against the national credit is recorded. The interest has to be paid—for ever presumably—unless Rumania decides some day to pay up.

But the interest paid on the Rumanian debt, although it is collected from the people of Canada by taxes on home life, is merely a bagatelle. As Sir Thomas White could explain (vide the report of the parliamentary committee on civil re-establishment), the issuing of securities by the government causes credit inflation. With this credit inflation, Sir Thomas testified, there must necessarily be an increase in prices. Increased prices are followed by increased wage demands and increased costs. But increased costs mean decreased purchasing power. The people as consumers tend to buy less. Merchants find themselves compelled to clear their shelves and warehouses at sacrifice prices—in some instances, at a loss. Manufacturers find themselves denied the necessary financial credit to keep their workers employed. Consequently, there is unemployment, with still further reduction of purchasing power.

Another Instance of Giving Credit.

The \$25,000,000 of credit inflation to finance the exporting of goods to Rumania is merely one example of the quandary into which the present business of exporting is plunging the industrialized nations. Last session the parliament of Canada voted \$20,000,000 of national credit for the use of private shipbuilding contractors, on the understanding, apparently, that some French shipping interests wanted to order ships from Canadian contractors. In this instance, parliament voted the money without actually knowing what would become of it. Nobody seems to have needed it.

This lavish generosity on the part of the government for the benefit of privileged interests at the expense of the people of Canada is in remarkable contrast with parliament's attitude when credit facilities are asked for the re-establishment of Canadian ex-service men in productive industries.

No Sympathy with Peck's Scheme.

When Col. C. W. Peck, V. C., member for Skeena, advocated loans to ex-service men to buy fishing boats to engage in the Canadian fishing industry he received very little support in the House. Why is it that the national credit can be made available in votes of \$20,000,000 for special privileged interests? The effect is rather to cause unemployment than to relieve it. For genuine productive proposals, such as the re-establishment of ex-service men in employment on Canadian natural resources, there is nothing but free advice to the former Canadian soldiers to develop more self-reliance. Does parliament control credit power, or merely serve private controllers?

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

CENSORING IS STRICT IN PROVINCE OF ALBERTA

Many Movies were Condemned—Why Movies are Banned at Edmonton

EDMONTON, Mar. 19.—One hundred and seventy-four moving picture films were condemned by the censor in Alberta last year; 112 other films suffered eliminations. These figures were given to the public accounts committee of the legislature by Howard Douglas, chief censor, who said that 10,000 feet of "rough stuff" clipped from films and stored in his archives represented only the unclaimed portion of censored shockers.

Mr. Douglas submitted to the committee copies of the standard which the Alberta censor employs in judging films. This is the standard adopted by the four western provinces. It puts under the ban pictures portraying "white slavery" unless a true moral lesson is conveyed; gruesome scenes involving bloodshed and corpses, offensive drunkenness and exploitation of notorious characters.

The censorship standard disapproves of pictures dealing with the drug habit, of scenes showing the methods of criminals in murder, house-breaking, poisoning, robbery, pocket-picking, lighting and throwing of bombs, use of ether, chloroform, etc., and other methods of persons employing violence against the law. The disapproval extends to pictures dealing with counterfeiting, with brutal treatment of children and of animals and with scenes dealing with ridicule of races, classes or social bodies, as well as irreverent and sacrilegious treatment of religious bodies or things held to be sacred.

Vulgarity of a "gross" kind also are disapproved such as sometimes appear in slap stick comedies, such as burlesquing morgues, funerals, insane asylums, hospitals, etc.

Other things under disapproval of the censorship are bathing scenes "which pass the limit of propriety," immodest dancing, needless exhibition of women in night dresses and lingerie, and studio and other scenes in which the human form is unduly exposed. Sensual kissing scenes and lovemaking and vampire scenes also come under the censor's frown.

PREPARING ARRIVAL AVIATORS IN PEACE

Fleet of Seaplanes to Operate between Peace River and Mackenzie

EDMONTON, Mar. 19.—The Royal Canadian Mounted Police are now making preparations for the arrival of the Dominion government's aviators at Peace River and the inauguration of the proposed aerial service to the north. The intention of the federal authorities, as previously announced, is to put a fleet of seaplanes in use between Peace River and Mackenzie River points. Government geologists, surveyors and other field workers will be transported in this way, together with their supplies.

Some of the police buildings at Peace River are being renovated and put in order as living quarters for the air men, of whom about twenty are expected. Workshop accommodation will also be provided. It is understood that the planes are now awaiting shipment from Ottawa and that the service will begin early in the spring.
