Garde Seems Very Optimistic.

A. G. Garde, the mining engineer, who has been in Victoria and Vancouver for some time taking up the matter of the establishment of steel works in this neighborhood, is very optimistic regarding the possibilities. He says he is assured his proposal for the use of the limonite of Copper River is the best that has yet been made. They have taken the data to England where they will lay it before the honored men who are proposing embarking in the big venture.

Mr. Garde has all the information at his disposal. He has personal knowledge of the mineral deposits and the country where it is proposed to establish the industry. He is backed by the member for the district, Hon. T. D. Patullo, and through him a site has been secured. The Provincial Government is encouraging the scheme by offering a bonus for the production of iron. All these things are in favor of the new industry being started. Possibly it may not come here, but with two such advocates for the district as Patullo and Garde backed by the Honorable the speaker of the House and the other northern members, we have a good fighting chance to secure it for Prince Rupert.

Always Working For the North.

Mr. Garde is one of the most able and optimistic exponents of the north as a future industrial and mining country. He has worked here for many years and all his interests are in the district. He believes in the north, lives most of his time here and breathes the northern atmosphere wherever he goes. He exudes northern optimism and has been of great value in bringing to the attention of people in the southern part of the province and elsewhere, the rich natural resources of this country.

Road From Here to Galloway Rapids.

The first section of the Skeena River road to be built will probably be that leading from this city to Galloway Rapids not far from Zanardi Rapids. It is not difficult to construct and would pass the famous Butze Rapids where there is a natural fall which forms a wonderful cataract. It would be one of the sights for visitors during the spring tides.

There should be some collaboration between the city and provincial government over the matter of building this road. The Government will commence its work at the city limits but it is hardly likely that they will commence a road which begins nowhere and ends nowhere. If one is built the other will have to be built also. It will be necessary to have the city end of the road to enable the workmen and material to get to the other part.

Progress in Spite Of Discouragements.

Prince Rupert was never better at this time of year than she is today. Naturally merchants are not getting big profits on their goods, for the day of the big profits is past. The price is dropping and often the store keepers sell at a loss. This cannot be remedied for there was a period when advances were made corresponding to the drop now in progress.

In spite of the many discouragements, there is a healthy optimism based on sound sense that will carry us along to a better condition. The north is developing fast. There are setbacks, but nothing permanent. The future looks rosy. The present might be worse than it is, and let the past go and forget it. Nothing can hold Prince Rupert back now she has a good start.

The time used is Pacific Standard, for the 120th Meridian west. It is counted from 0 to 24 hours from midnight to midnight.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

BALL TEAMS
IN TRAINING

National and American League
Men Go to Various Camps

NEW YORK, Mar. 4.—Baseball players, veterans and rookies, representing sixteen major league clubs, will be training under the southern sun for the 1921 pennant races before the close of the present week. Already the migration of the National and American league squads is under way and some of the older stars have indulged in a week or two of preliminary work at the various mineral baths before undertaking the more strenuous training of the southland.

In the selection of the training camps, the various managers have shown the same wide difference of opinion regarding the choice of quarters that has prevailed in the past. Divided into states the list shows that Texas is favored by seven clubs; Louisiana named by four; Florida and Arkansas by two each and California one.

Nine of the clubs have selected sites different from those used in 1920, while seven will return to the same parks or quarters used 12 months ago for the conditioning of the players. Of the 16 clubs, the Chicago Nationals will be the only squad to return to the same camp for the third consecutive season; Pasadena, Calif., having the call.


