Is Most Honored American Officer in Great Britain-Canadian

LONDON, May 21 .- When Rear Admiral Sims, of the United States Navy and former commander of the American naval forces in the war zone, arrives in England tomorrow he will receive the degree of Doctor of Laws at

Cambriage University. Rear Admiral Sims is the recipient of more official honors in Britain than were ever before extended to a naval officer of the United States.
