Peter Corrigan, of Hazelton, arrived last night in the city and is registered at the Hotel Prince Rupert.

The truant officer for the city schools is to be asked to submit a report to the school board at the next meeting.

Constable and Mrs. R. Ponder arrived from Masset on the Prince Albert which arrived shortly after midnight last night.

E. Collinson, Indian, was fined \$50.50 by Magistrate McDermott this morning for having liquor illegally in his possession.

The La Casse Bakery has secured the business of supplying bread to the city jail, their tender of 9½¢ per loaf being the lowest submitted.

An application from Provincial Police Constable W. S. Ackroyd for a position on the city police force was referred by the police commission this morning to the chief of police.

Permission was granted by the School Board last night for the children to parade today in a demonstration for community playgrounds. If the weather is not suitable today it will take place on Monday.

A \$500 account from the Thiel Detective Agency for services rendered by Detectives Smith and Money last summer in obtaining liquor convictions has been passed by the police commission. The amount was considered somewhat high.

Kong Sack, Sun Kwong, Hong Lee, Gin Kwong, Yen and Young Wong, Chinese, charged with contravention of the Drug Act appeared before Magistrate McDermott this morning on charges preferred by the Mounted Police and were remanded until Monday.

W. J. Dyke, brother of H. A. Dyke who mysteriously disappeared at Christmas, returned to Seattle last night. Although no trace has been found of his brother, Mr. Dyke is satisfied that there was no foul play, but fears that the missing man was drowned.

The police commission at its meeting this morning gave instructions to Chief Vickers to obtain from the provincial inspector of weights and measures a set of testing weights to be used in checking up the scales and balances of local tradespeople. The city at present has no way of testing the accuracy of the scales used in stores and other places.

The city police are to carry out more strictly the enforcement of the B.C. Prohibition Act as regards boats at the waterfront. It was pointed out at the police commission meeting this morning that the city police can go aboard boats moored at the wharves or at a short distance from them without warrants. The city limits includes 2,551 acres of water area and this section is under the jurisdiction of the city police.
