Difficulties of Self-government.

The city of Alberni has approached the Provincial Govern- sons. ment, through its mayor, and asked that the incorporation charter be cancelled and that the affairs of the municipality be once more managed by the Provincial Government direct. The inspector of municipalities will investigate and report. The request is backed by more than two-thirds of the property owners.

The difficulty is that half the lands of the municipality have been returned to the municipality at tax sales and the present tax rate is 40 mills on the dollar. The people own their own waterworks and lighting plant and these will have to be operated by private concerns if the Provincial Government agrees

administer their affairs. The example of Alberni is one that must prove a warning to all municipalities to go carefully and see that they get full value for all expenditures. There is a tendency in all governmentowned concerns to forget that they must be conducted on business lines. Value must be received for every dollar expended or the

end is likely to be the same as that of Alberni. Every city needs improvements and Prince Rupert must keep in line with other places. She must grade her streets and put in sewers, but she must also see that value is received every time. Businesses that are not well conducted fail and go out of existence. The same happens with cities. The future success of a city depends on having the expenditures kept well within the income and seeing that all work is done just as economically as it would be under contract.
