WOMAN WORKED AS MINER IN KLONDIKE

Mrs. Clara Reigate Returns to Dawson and Will Mingle at Mayo.

DAWSON, Aug. 30.—Mrs. Clara Reigate, one of the pioneer women of Dawson, returned here last month from the coast, where she had been living for years, and, after a short visit here proceeded to the Mayo district, the centre of the promising silver developments in the Yukon. Mrs. Reigate mushed many miles over the camp, and staked some claims, and is enthusiastic over the outlook of the camp from a mining standpoint and its scenic and climatic charms.

Mrs. Reigate is a woman of exceptional energy and capabilities, as proved in the early days here. She participated in the activities of Dawson and the mining camp in business and mining circles in '97 and '98, and until 1903, when she closed out her Klondike interests and retired, and made her home on the coast. She is a native Oregonian, and spent her summers, as a rule, in the Oregon metropolis and her winters in California.

Husband Drowned.
In 1901 Mrs. Reigate's husband, Fred Reigate, who was the owner of one of the richest placer gold claims on Cheechako Hill, in the famous Bonanza Valley, near Dawson, was lost on the ill-fated steamer Islander, and with him went down a heavy shipment of gold which he was taking to the coast. Mrs. Reigate immediately took hold of the mining property, which was located near the rich property of the late Senator Lynch, and donning the overalls, worked in the drift as a miner in charge of a large crew of men in her employ. In 1903 she closed out the interests there after having recovered from the property a competence and having had all the experience of a real miner in the darling underground work.

She was known in the boom days as one of the few successful women miners of the great gold camp. After years of absence from the Klondike she has returned with a glowing interest in the old camp, and is equally enthusiastic over the prospects of the new silver region in the Mayo district.
