No Trace Found Of Missing Ship SERIOUS RIOTS AT BELFAST CONTINUE; RAILWAY STRIKE SETTLED

Wreckage Found Canadian Importer Except Deck Lumber

VANCOUVER, August 30.—The hope of the local officials of the Canadian Government Merchant Marine that the steamship *Hyder* is still afloat is diminished somewhat this morning with the receipt of radio messages from the masters of the *Observer* and Canadian *Winner*, two of the vessels which were searching for the missing steamer.

John Cooper of the *Observer* in his message states that he has been unable to find any trace, whatever of the *Importer*, which was the *Winner* expresses disappointment at the failure to locate the missing steamer.

The latter is somewhat disappointed regarding her fate, but the fact that the *Hyder* has not been found is a relief to the importer.

The lumber which the *Hyder* carried on her deck and which was thrown overboard

is the fate of the members of the crew there is no word. No one of the lifeboats has been seen.

of the vessel after five days, but still searching.

VANCOUVER, Aug. 30.—No word has yet been received from the Canadian importer after five days of searching.

Maritime officials of this coast are continuing the search for the ship.

In the absence of any lifeboats, the crew of forty-four men is believed to have all perished with the boat.

CONSUL HILL
TO ENGLAND; WAS
FORMERLY THIS CITY

VANCOUVER, Aug. 30.—James H. Hill, formerly United States consul at Prince Rupert, has been appointed United States consul at Manchester, England, and leaves New York on the *Hyder* to assume the duties of his office.

Consul Hill arrived at Prince Rupert shortly after his departure from Vancouver, where he was accompanied by his wife and daughter.

It is anticipated that it will take about two days to load here.

Will Be Handed Over to Government by Wallace Shipyards Some Time Tomorrow.

The new Canadian Government Merchant Marine steamer, *Canadian*, will likely be loaded and away on her maiden trip by Saturday according to present plans. It is expected that she will be turned over by the Wallace Shipyards to the government owners on Thursday and the longshoremen have been sent for to be here ready to load lumber and salmon at the material wharf by Thursday noon. Before that time the crew of the steamer will have been signed on.

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NO SEDITION IN GERMANY IS ALLOWED

Country Under Restrictions Closely Approaching Martial Law.

BERLIN, Aug. 30.—Germany is today under restrictions closely approaching martial law as a result of a decree of President Ebert. Meetings, processions, demonstrations and the issuance of publications likely to encourage seditious movements is forbidden and warning is given that any and every insurrection will be suppressed with relentless severity.

PRINCESS LOUISE WAS LAUNCHED YESTERDAY WALLACE SHIPYARDS

VANCOUVER, Aug. 30.—The passenger steamer *Princess Louise* built for the C. P. R. by the Wallace shipyards, was successfully launched yesterday. This is a steel vessel which will be used in the passenger business of the coast and is said to be the last word in modern ship construction in providing for the comfort of the public.

REVENUE CUTTER IS BACK AT NOME FROM VISIT TO FAR NORTH

NOME, Aug. 30.—The United States Revenue Cutter *Bear* returned to Nome after a voyage which took the boat to Demarcation Bay. This is the first time since 1888 that the Government ship has reached that point which marks the end of Alaska on the border line of Canadian territory.

Running Fight With Bandits at Regina in which Mountie was Wounded; Many Shots Fired

REGINA, August 30.—After a running gun fight lasting half an hour, extending over five miles through the outskirts of the city, the police found the bandits who bound and gagged Detective Hays. They were captured on a farm to the north of the city.

During the battle between the bandits and the police one man was wounded, two automobiles were held up, 200 shots were fired and four men arrested. The wounded man is Sergeant Longhead, R. C. M. P., and one of the men arrested is Edward Watson of Vancouver.

READJUSTMENT OF FINANCES

Convention of Municipalities Will Try to Improve Position with Province.

PORT ALBERNI, Aug. 30.—The B. C. Municipalities commenced a supreme effort to get financial assistance from the provincial government through the annual convention of the B. C. Municipalities which will open here tomorrow. Prominent officials arriving here state they are determined to succeed in the fight for municipal financial readjustment.

INSURGENTS HOLD STRIP OF TERRITORY

VIENNA, Aug. 30.—Burgeland a narrow strip of land along the Hungarian border, which was awarded to Austria by the treaty with Germany, is apparently in the hands of Hungarian insurgents.

SWEEP OVER FALLS AND DASHED TO DEATH

NIAGARA FALLS, Aug. 30.—Edgar H. Rippon of Buffalo was swept over the Bridal Veil Falls and dashed to death on the rocks. His body has been recovered.

Serious Rioting Takes Place at Belfast and Strike on the Great Northern Irish Railway

BELFAST, August 30.—Street fighting has been in progress since yesterday, and was particularly violent this afternoon. One laborer was shot and killed and several others wounded, including an army sergeant.

Civilians placed sandbags in the streets and maintained a heavy fire against the police and military.

BELFAST, August 30.—Rioting, which broke out at noon yesterday and continued until after midnight, began again at 7 this morning. One hour later three persons were wounded. During last night's fighting two persons were killed and six wounded.

For the first time in its history, the Great Northern Irish Railway was completely tied up by a strike of engineers and firemen, who quit at midnight. This was a sequel to the government turning the control of the railroad back into the hands of its owners.

BELFAST, August 29.—Rioting was renewed this afternoon. A visitor to the city was shot and died on reaching the hospital. Another was wounded.

BELFAST, August 30.—The engineers and firemen of the Great Northern Railway, who struck following a dispute with the management, have returned to their posts.

The Stewart Hospital is facing financial difficulties at the present time and the withdrawal of the support of the Premier Company will make the situation even more serious.

STOPPED BOOTLEGGING

Similar Plebiscite to Be Held at Other Company Towns on Coast.

VANCOUVER, Aug. 30.—A vote having voted three to one for a liquor store, Bert Kergin, M.P. P. left last night for the north to take up with the Granby officials the question of acquiring a site for a store.

Similar plebiscites are to be taken shortly at Powell River, Ocean Falls, and Britannia.

The Liquor Board has decided the proper way to deal with company towns is to request a plebiscite. "Bootlegging has been disposed of in towns where we have liquor stores," adds Chairman Falconer of the board.
