LABOR CLAUSE NOT GOING IN

Would Delay Water Agreement and Considered No Matter for Civic Legislation.

After considerable discussion had taken place at the council meeting last night regarding the advisability of having an anti-Oriental labor clause inserted in the water agreement between the Prince Rupert Pulp and Paper Co. and the city, a vote was taken and the resolution to this effect brought in by Ald. Kelly and Ald. McNeill, was negatived on the following division: For the clause—Ald. Kelly, Ald. McNeill, Ald. Kerr and Ald. Perry. Against the clause—Ald. Parker, Ald. Silversides, Ald. Frizzell and Acting Mayor Dybhavn.

The matter arose on the reading of a letter from the Trades and Labor Council which stated that the organization would protest any agreement which did not have embodied in it an anti-Asiatic clause and would wage a campaign against it.

The Resolution.

Ald. Kelly moved a resolution that the City Council communicate with the Prince Rupert Pulp and Paper Co. pointing out the agitation that was going on in favor of an anti-Oriental clause, reminding it of the statement made by Mr. Bell, an official of the company, that the payroll of the plant would not exceed 20 per cent for Oriental labor and asking if the company was prepared to have such a clause embodied in the water agreement. The bylaw had not yet gone through its third reading and this could still be inserted.

This was seconded by Ald. McNeill, who stated that it had been the company's own proposition.

A Touchy Subject.

Acting Mayor Dybhavn pointed out that this was a very touchy subject and hardly a matter on which municipalities could legislate.

Ald. Kelly replied that if the pulp mill was going to be an Asiatic proposition it would do no good to the city anyway and the people would rather do without it.

Ald. Parker thought that the City Council did not need to go into the matter again. He was as much opposed to Oriental labor as anyone but he did not think this was a matter for municipalities to take a stand in.

Ald. McNeill considered that the company should be held to its promise.

Giving Nothing Away.

Ald. Silversides felt like Ald. Parker. The company was receiving from the city only its surplus water which it could not use itself and he saw no reason why this should be used as a means to dictate to it in the matter of labor.

Ald. Parker was of the opinion that the citizens were more afraid of Oriental labor in this connection than was necessary. In Ocean Falls and Swanson Bay, where the companies were absolutely in control of everything, he would venture to state that not more than twenty-five per cent of the payroll was for Oriental labor.

Ald. Kerr stated that both the city council and the company wanted this agreement to pass the ratepayers and if no anti-Oriental clause was inserted there would be a lot of opposition to it, even outside the Trades and Labor Council. The first council had legislated along these lines when it had refused to give liquor licenses to anyone employing Orientals or city street work to Orientals.

Would Make Delay.

City Solicitor Hooper suggested that the clause be inserted in the power agreement instead of avoid holding up the water agreement which had not been signed both by the city and the company. This would have the same effect for the company had said that it did not want one agreement without the other. To insert this clause in the water agreement now would probably delay it for three or four weeks.

Ald. Perry stated that he was in sympathy with the inclusion of an anti-Oriental clause.

City Clerk Woods pointed out that the agreement would have to be passed at the next meeting of the council if it were to come before the people on September 21.

Acting Mayor Dybhavn then called the discussion to a close and asked for the taking of the vote.
