There is a great bunch of material this year to choose from in baseball and fans predict that Prince Rupert will be able to muster this summer the best baseball that the city has ever possessed. The lack of space in which to play is going to be felt worse than ever here this year. There will likely be four baseball teams in the City League and five senior football teams. This problem was felt last year but this season it may be serious. If boys between 16 and 21 can be kept occupied at athletics instead of being on the streets they will be less likely to get into bad company and trouble. To provide them places to engage in athletics is a question that should be given serious consideration. The bringing up of these youths along good, clean and healthy lines such as would be the case if they engaged in athletics would be worth a lot of money to Prince Rupert.

It is easy for the athletes and fans of Prince Rupert to howl at the municipal government for improved sports grounds and more ball parks but they often forget that it is not easy for the city to obtain money to spend for these purposes. The city, after all, is just like a company and its business is not as big as that of many companies, neither does it handle so much money. Its business is governed by the laws of revenue and expenditure. There is more required than that the council just vote the money and there is not an unlimited supply as some people would appear to think. However, the sport accommodation problem in this city is getting to such a state where, if it would seem, the council would be justified in spending some money on it.
