Dempsey Is Making Great Preparations for Big Fight

The fact that Dempsey started his training grind in preparation for the contest of July 2 two months beforehand must mean one of two things. Either the champion has badly retrogressed as to physical condition, or else it is the usual advertising dodge on the part of the promoters to give the newspapermen something to write of in order constantly to keep the match before the attention of the public.

To any one who knows anything about athletics and conditioning, it is ridiculous to presume that a man like Dempsey needs any more than a few weeks in which to get himself into trim if he is in anything like the condition he should be for a man who is in his particular line of making a livelihood. Assuming that he has not gone to the bow-wows physically, there is no need for this long drawn-out siege of preparation. It is likely to pall on him and, in the end will defeat its own purpose in the chance of making him go stale.

Was He Stale? It will be remembered that the alibi Dempsey put up for the comparatively poor showing he made against Brennan was the fact that he did not seem to be able to get "started." The reason for this was ascribed to Dempsey going stale. Now, Dempsey didn't train two months for Brennan, or anything like that length of time, so either his alibi for that occasion must fall to the ground, or he is deliberately repeating his mistake. Not only repeating it, but exaggerating it by undergoing an even longer session of training than he took against Brennan.

The writer does not incline to the opinion that Dempsey has gone to the bow-wows physically. Far from it. At the same time, it is not likely he is as physically fit as he was when he fought Willard, nearly two years ago. During that interval of time Dempsey has trod the primrose path to a more or less extent. Granting that he has done no dissipating, which usually means drinking in case of the athlete, we doubt if even Dempsey himself would deny that he has kept later hours in the matter of staying up at night and slaying in bed in the mornings than is prescribed for the conditioning of an athlete.

Not Same as Before Recent pictures show the fact that Dempsey is not the physical Dempsey of two years ago. The excess adipose tissue has filled out and smoothed over those little ridges of muscles which are so beautiful in the trained athlete. No question but what Dempsey will get rid of most of this excess filling, but it is always more difficult after it once gets in than it is to keep it out. What retrogression there has been in the case of Dempsey should be only slight—the natural decline which comes of easy living and more or less irregular hours, and it is a condition which hardly requires a two months course of preparation to restore. Hence the conclusion is that whatever training stunts he now indulges in more for a matter of getting publicity than it is for any actual good it will do the man physically. Kearns has announced that he will take charge of the conditioning of Dempsey. Just what qualifications Kearns has as a trainer remains to be seen if he is working Dempsey now, when Dempsey is in the fine condition both men assert, then it would seem that he is starting off on the wrong foot.


