### SEARCHING FOR RIVER OF GOLD LIQUOR CRAZED BREED MURDERS

Prospectors Leaving Edmonton to Follow Old Indian Trail. Another Ghastly Crime Committed north of Edmonton.

EDMONTON, May 28.—Search for a lost river—a river of gold his body and with his throat cut—will be undertaken this year and terrible gashes in the head by several prospectors, including Oliver Desjarlais, is dead at old timers from the Yukon and Grouard and his alleged assailant, who are now here out, not. Some years ago an Indian entered into after a drinking brought into Fort St. John a fair sized gold nugget which, according to the tale told by old timers of the north, he discovered in a stream in the country to the northeast of the post.

Soon after this an old trapper, a white man, who made Fort St. John his headquarters, came into the Fort with a quantity of course gold which he had washed from some stream in a similar direction to that from which the Indian hailed.

He never visited his trap lines after this, living on the fat of the land in care-free idleness at the post. He often appeared whenever his supplies of food and other necessities ran low, and would be away for a few days, always returning with a fresh supply of gold.

This aged trapper lived in this manner for a number of years, he died, as many trappers and north country men have, on the trail. His body was found frozen. With him went his secret, never having told to anyone the location of his find. The books of the Hudson's Bay Company still contain a large credit account in the name of the old trapper.

Northmen, who tell the story of the mystic El Dorado north of the Peace, declare that the gold was only available after a long fall of snow, with which the old fellow apparently washed his mineral. From an analysis of the circumstances generally, it is thought that the place from which the gold was taken was some old river bed, where the Peace once flowed, but whether the story is correct or not remains to be proved.

Prospectors, however, are putting in good money to test the truth of the theory that the precious metal does exist somewhere to the north of Clear Hills in large quantities.

EDMONTON, May 28.—With the ghostly crime, according to the police report, followed a drunken brawl which both men are half-breeds.

According to a brief wire received by Superintendent Bryan of the Alberta Provincial Police, Chailleaux was arrested immediately following the altercation. The wire received read as follows:

"Oliver Desjarlais, breed of Grouard, badly stabbed in right, throat badly cut and is expected to die in forty-eight hours. Bernard Chailleaux is now under arrest on a technical charge of assault and has been remanded for eight days."

Shortly following the receipt of the above, news reached local police headquarters that the wounded man had succumbed and that the charge against the accused had been changed to that of murder.

Corporal Chapman who effected the arrest reached Edmonton with his prisoner on Thursday.

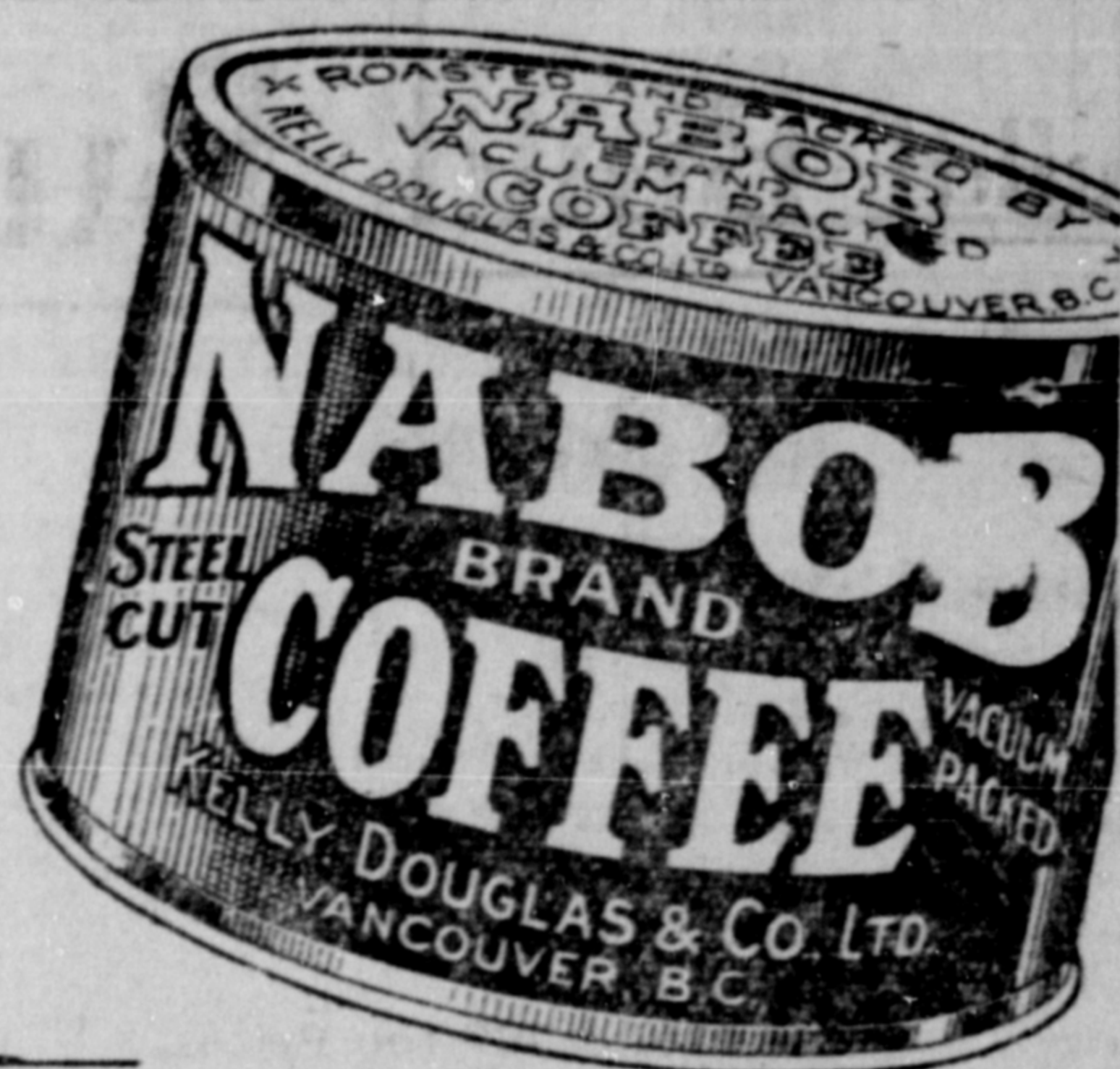
### NATIONAL HEADWEAR OF TURKEY CHANGED

NEW YORK, May 28.—Naughty dances are now barred in New York. No more can the girls shake their shoulders and do the toddle. Nor can they continue to enjoy that spectacular dance which calls for rigid feet and shoulders and gentle swaying of the remainder of the anatomy. The commission of Board of Health ruled that naughty dances were good and to prove that he means business has appointed a squad of several hundred deputies whose business it is to see that the law is maintained.

In the latest issue of Selznick News, there is given an illustration of each of the naughty dances, while another flash shows one of the commissioner's deputies in the act of barring the toddle.
