Sir J. Flavelle Urges Borrowing Large Sum for Canadian National

Street Sales 450

Thinks Railway Would be Success if Sheared of Incumberances and Given Proper Support by Parliament, Press and Public

OTTAWA, August 25.—Sir Joseph Flavelle, formerly Grand Trunk director, writes Premier Meighen that the Canadian National Railway scheme, if properly administered and relieved of the present handicaps, will prove successful. He submits a plan for the reorganization of the railways which he thinks will bring success if "politics will permit and Parliament and the press will allow the necessary freedom and give the necessary support."

In order to secure success increased population is necessary and economies of operation must bring down the cost from the present figures of 95.94 on the Grand Trunk and 170.33 on the Grand Trunk Pacific.

Sir Joseph Flaveile suggests giving the National Railways \$750,000,000 and the Government taking common shares at par in payment of advances. The initial cost of construction of the Intercolonial and transcontinental railways should be written off.

Reply of Irish Republicans to Lloyd George Received at Downing Street.

LONDON, Aug. 25 .- A reply to the peace offer of Premier Lloyd George was received at 10 Downing Street at 1 o'clock this afternoon from the Irish Republicans. It is learned that official circles here do not consider the communication as terminating negotiations, although the contents are being withheld pending a conference of the cabinet.

MANY LOST WRECK OF DIRIGIBLE

Was Falling to City Streets When Diverted to the River Humber.

HULL, Aug. 25 .- Seventeen Americans and 27 British were killed in the disaster when the dirgible ZR-2 was wrecked over this city, falling into the River Humber. There are five survivors, who tell stories indicating that there was probably a leak in the gas tank which ignited from a spark from the engine.

The giant dirigible, which was 965 feet long, buckled and broke in half and instantly fell in flames, headed straight for the streets of the city, but apparently was headed off with the last effort of control, precipitating the wreck into the River Humber instead. When the broken halves struck the river they were a mile apart.
