### FOUND THEIR MAN HIDING IN TRUNK

J. M. Nelson Pleaded Guilty to Serious Charge in Police Court.

J. M. Nelson, who pleaded guilty in the police court this morning to vagrancy and supporting himself by the avails of prostitution, created somewhat of a precedent. The charge is a serious one and it is seldom a person accused of it pleads guilty.

Early this morning Sergeant McGlinchy and Constable Macdonald visited Comox Avenue, in pursuit of the accused. Searching a house he was eventually found hiding inside a travelling trunk. He asked for a chance and was told by the officers that they would leave it to Chief Vickers' decision. Later Sergeant Bailey and Constable Ponstie were sent for him and arrested him and brought him to the station.

Accused comes up for sentence tomorrow morning.

Minnie Johnson, Indian, charged with drunkenness, and Martin Hanson, charged with supplying, were remanded until this afternoon on appearing before Indian Agent Perry this morning for trial.

### SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

Minimum price of first-class and second-class land reduced to \$5 an acre, second class to \$2 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering all land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emption abolished but parts of more than four man-arrange for adjacent pre-emption with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claim for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least one acre.

Where pre-emption is in operation less than 2 years, and has made no portable improvements, he may be cause of ill-health, or other cause, to obtain a certificate of non-fulfillment and transfer his claim.

Records, without permanent residence may be bought, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$250 per annum and records same each year for 2 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 2 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his first, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homestead, title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 60 acres may be leased by contract or lease, or by mill, factory or industrial site on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased, conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural gas pipelines, purchase of existing roads may be purchased conditionally upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT. The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under the Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the great war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptors are due or payable by widows on pre-emptions recorded after 26, 1918. Fees are required for five years.

Provision for return of monies accrued, due and been paid since August 1, 1918, on account of payments for tax on sales or other pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of the public, or by their heirs, direct or indirect, remitted from enrollment to March 31, 1920.

### SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS

Provision made for issuance of Crown Grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase involving forfeiture on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

### GRAZING

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged, priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travelers, up to ten head.

### PEACE ARCH ERECTED RECENTLY AT BLAINE

Formal Opening to Take Place on September 6 Next on Pacific Highway.

VANCOUVER, Aug. 25.—The Peace Arch at Blaine, Washington, on the line which separates the United States and the Dominion of Canada, has been built to commemorate the fact that, for one hundred years since the signing of the Treaty of Ghent between Great Britain and the United States, there has been peace between these two great democracies, and that, for a century, the people of the United States and the people of Canada have lived in peace and harmony, divided by a line which, from end to end, has carried no fortification, which has been unarmed and ungarrisoned, which has not been beaten by the tread of sentry.

This symbol of world peace, based upon the faithful observance of the sacredness of a "scrap of paper," erected on what is proposed to be a new route for the Pacific Highway as this north and south great road crosses the international boundary-line not a hundred yards from the waters of Sequim Bay, an inlet of the Gulf of Georgia, will be dedicated on September 6, as an expression of the two peoples that, in so far as they are concerned, there shall be no more war, as a Mizpah calling God to witness that we will not pass over it to them, nor they to us, for harm, as a message to all the world that no disputes need arise between communities, even though such communities live under diverse forms of political organization, that cannot be settled by adjudication and without resort to ravage and destruction and the slaughter of men.
