### Basketball Season Great Success.

The basketball season which is just drawing to a close has been a great success. It has more than justified the originators of the Athletic Association in the action they took to bring the institution into existence.

Unfortunately just as the season opened, there was trouble at the shipyard and the work there was suspended with the result that many of the local athletes left town. It caused a setback from which there was no recovery. In spite of that, however, good use has been made of the building by the young people, especially for basketball. A splendid series has been carried out very successfully and great credit for this is due the members of the basketball association that kept everything moving. Both boys and girls have benefited from the fine sport that has been provided.

### Daughters of Empire Have Been Active.

A good deal of activity has been shown during the year by the Daughters of the Empire in carrying out their various projects, all looking to the betterment of social or other conditions and providing an outlet for the energies of a number of groups of women, all with the unselfish idea of helping on some good cause.

For over ten years the Daughters of the Empire have been organized here and since the inception of the order it has never ceased its good work. It is proposed in the near future to erect a permanent home with community facilities which will benefit the whole city. It is to be hoped that it will be found possible to proceed with the work this year. The society has the land paid for and considerable money on hand set aside for the purpose of erecting a substantial building.

### Air Flights Comparatively Safe.

The Manufacturers' Aircraft Association announces that air travel is just as safe as any other travel. They have an enviable record, certainly. According to their figures, 115,163 passengers were carried a total distance of 3,136,550 miles in commercial airplanes and there was not a single life lost. These figures are based on the performance of 425 planes out of an estimated number of approximately 4,000 planes throughout the country.

When we look back but a few years and remember the advent of the automobile and the difficulties attendant upon its introduction, there is every reason to believe that air travel will soon become very popular.

### Coal Situation To Be Investigated.

The Provincial Government has granted a commission of inquiry into the coal situation in the province with a view to ascertaining whether or not the public are being over charged. This is an admirable move. The Daily News strongly favored such an appointment and it is to be hoped that it will have the effect of either reducing the price of the product or allaying public feeling which is undoubtedly strong in regard to the matter.

Dealings in connection with commodities which everybody uses and which are natural resources of the province, are always of public interest and all such should be open to the public.

The time used is Pacific Standard, for the 120th Meridian west. It is counted from 0 to 24 hours from midnight to midnight.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

### APPLICATIONS FOR GRAZING PERMITS UNDER GRAZING ACT 1919.

Applications for permits to graze livestock on the Crown range within each Grazing District of the Province of British Columbia during the grazing season of 1921 must be filed with the District Foresters at Cariboo, Cranbrook, Fort George, Kamloops, Nelson, Prince Rupert, Vancouver, Vernon or with the Commissioner of Grazing, Department of Lands at Victoria, B. C., on or before March 31, 1921.

Blank forms upon which to submit applications may be obtained from the District Foresters at the above named places or from the Department of Lands at Victoria.

The grazing of livestock on the Crown range without permit constitutes trespass, prohibited by law.

## CHOPS HEADS OFF CULPRITS

### Chinese Using Drastic Measures to Rid Country of Bandits

SHANGHAI, Feb. 22.—Reports brought to Shanghai by river craft from the upper Yangtze are that the Chinese authorities, in seeking to quell outlawry and suppress disorders, following the looting of the city of Ichang by mutinous troops have adopted the most drastic methods. All captured bandits, say the reports, are executed with little or no formality.

A scene characteristic of descriptions of the working of Chinese justice was described by Captain T. F. Doyle, of the steamer Mai Shun which recently came to Shanghai. When his steamer was at Wahhsien coaling Captain Doyle said those aboard saw 28 culprits led to the river bank. These were forced to kneel in a line and then the executioner with his heavy two-handed sword proceeded slowly down the line, a head falling with each swing of the sword.

## SPEAKER MANSON IS ASSERTING RIGHTS

### Shows Independence by Ruling Against Premier Oliver in Legislature

Speaker Manson is "treating 'em rough" these days and on two successive days he has had occasion to call Premier Oliver to order, says the Victoria Colonist. In fact the second rebuff administered to the Premier appeared to take that gentleman's breath away for a minute.

On Wednesday, when J. W. Jones, Conservative member for South Okanagan, was speaking, the Premier rose to a point of order, but Mr. Speaker reminded the Premier that his point was not well taken and that the member in making the statements to which the Premier took offence was quite within his rights.

### Premier's Position

Yesterday Premier Oliver took occasion to inform the member for South Okanagan that certain questions of his—on the order paper would not be answered if the information desired was to be found in departmental reports, even if those reports were not brought down to the House.

### Private Members' Rights

"It is the right of a private member to obtain information. On the other hand, private members ought not to ask questions if the information can be obtained directly from some other source. I will let the matter stand, and if the report is not presented within a few days I think the member would be quite right in insisting."

Mayor Morley and the entire city council of Victoria have been unseated, Judge Gregory declaring that the election was invalid owing to the voters' list being improperly compiled.

Mickey O'Brien, a boxer, and his manager, Harry Krantz, were rejected as undesirable and refused a landing at Prince Rupert today by Dr. Reddie, immigration inspector, on the arrival of the steamer Ramona here. They have gone on to Skagway instead of staying here where a bout was to have been staged.

Ernest Love has been appointed superintendent of municipal utilities at a salary of \$200.
