Coroner's Jury Recommends, However, That Death of Patient Be Further Investigated

NEW WESTMINSTER, Sept. 17:-A verdict of accidental death was returned yesterday by the coroner's jury at the inquest into the death of an inmate of Essondale mental hospital who died this week allegedly as a result of treatment at the hands of three attendants of the institution who were discharged following the incident on August 26. The jury recommended, however, that an inquiry be held into the circumstances of death.

The dead person was Otto Englestad of Vancouver who had been a patient in the institution since 1925. He was subdued by three attendants during trouble with a work gang on the asylum grounds.

An autopsy showed that Englestad, who died last Tuesday night, had suffered five broken ribs, nu-merous bruises about the body and TO LIVE internal injuries.

The three attendants were Harry Maisonneuve, Malcolm McDonald and Archibald Lennox, all of whom are charged with causing grievous bodily harm.
