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ALICE ARM MAN SAYS DEMPSEY WILL WIN SURE

Steve Dumas, Authority on Boxing, Backs Up His Opinion.

Steve Dumas, of Alice Arm, is a practical boxer and wrestler and has followed ring history pretty closely for many years. He knows a lot about Dempsey and Carpentier and has set down his reasons for the opinion that the latter will win on July 2. This is how he figures it out:

With July 2 but three weeks away, people in all parts of the globe are asking the question: "Has Carpentier a chance to defeat the superhuman Dempsey, in a twenty-foot ring?" The quiet retired folk of French descent in both Canada and the United States, who never before have taken an interest in boxing and who know nothing about the records of either fighter, are banking—hook, line and sinker—on Carpentier. Down in Quebec, the farmers are betting their cows and chickens at even money on the Frenchman to win. But the French Canadian elites and the people of French descent, who have followed pugilism for years, are not so optimistic about Carpentier's chances. They are betting on the present champion to knock out The Pride of France and send him back to the coal mines at Lens.

What History Shows.

Looking back over the long number of years, since there have been heavyweight championship bouts, it is noticeable that Carpentier is the first challenger who has been boosted so much to win by the press and ex-champions. Yet he has taxed defeat many times and every fighter of any prominence whom he has met since 1907 has either knocked him out or made him quit cold, losing on default.

Looking back over the records of the various heavyweight champions there has not been one who has been knocked out more than once before winning the title. Bob Fitzsimmons, the greatest man of any weight, barring Dempsey, who ever stepped into the ring, lost to Jim Hall in Australia in 1890 but later, in 1893, reversed the decision in New Orleans. Then came Jack Johnson, the greatest defensive fighter with a punch who ever held the belt. He also met defeat at the hands of Joe Choynski in three rounds. The present champion was defeated in one round by Jim Flynn, the Pueblo freeman, when he was a novice at the game—but he later reversed the decision by knocking Flynn out in 42 seconds. In none of these cases did the fighter refuse to leave his corner but met defeat like a man and in only one case was the decision not reversed. The same cannot be said of Carpentier for in not a single instance has a reversed decision been given against him.

Quick Knockout.

Carpentier's ring history will repeat itself on July 2 and the fatal 10 will be counted for him and that within six rounds. He and his supporters are endeavoring to impress the public that

the fight will not go over four rounds, and perhaps, he is right, the Frenchman is going into the ring not with the intention of fighting Dempsey but with the intention of boxing him. He is training for speed and he will need it, too, but the little birds will whisper ten and out for him at about the first round house after the three mile post when the Sage Brush mauler gets on his trail.

If Dempsey stood flat footed and let Carpentier swing at him unawares, it is doubtful if it would have any effect. The Frenchman cannot be given credit for defeating such parlor boxers as Bombardier Wells and Becket, both possessors of glass jaws, nor poor old Levinsky, who was thinking of starting a pawn shop, when Carpentier put one over on him.

The Two Records.

Sketching over Carpentier's record and comparing it with that of Dempsey, leaving all prejudice aside, it would seem that he has not a chance to win unless something unexpected happens like happened to Luther McCarthy at Calgary in 1913.

Dempsey, without a doubt, is the greatest fighter the world has ever produced. He has done all that was ever asked of him in the pugilistic line. Many "white hopes" have been brought to him and he has defeated them all, in many cases with one punch. He is still only a boy and will not be at his best for four years yet. It is always a good bet to stay with the champion until his thirtieth year and that will be found to be correct if one goes back over ring history of the last forty years.

Sport Chat

Babe Ruth's two home runs on Tuesday placed him sixteen days ahead of his record last year. Besides this, Bambino has made another record in knocking out seven round-trippers in five days. The big fellow is performing at a rate which is more than exceeding the expectations of his many followers and the present run of big hits is nothing less than phenomenal. Nothing like it has ever before been seen in organized baseball. If he keeps going like this he can almost win the American League pennant single handed for the Yankees. At the present time he is worth any three other men on the team and opposing aggregations are facing a great handicap in playing against him.

Yesterday was the last day of the four days' enforced holiday for Jack Dempsey, heavyweight champion of the world, at his camp at Atlantic City. Today he again starts the grind of training for the big battle on July 2 after having rested since last Sunday. He will probably now be permitted to do some boxing as the damaged eye is pretty well healed. There are but fifteen days now before he must step in the ring at Jersey City with Georges Carpentier, European champion, to contest for the world's title.

Again Fred Gillhuber has shown his keen antihulism for local sport as shown by the announcement yesterday that he had offered to donate medals for the Juvenile League. He has certainly demonstrated his generosity in this concrete method of helping things along. There is another name that cannot be overlooked when talking junior athletics in this city and that is the name of W. J. Cash, the active manager of the Juvenile and Junior Leagues. It solely due to his efforts that the youngsters are so well organized in athletic lines, especially base ball, as they are here today. In doing this he has rendered a service to the community that perhaps no other man, alone, has done. Having no boys of his own, the genial "W. J." has practically become a father to fifty or more lads of the town, and he is respected and admired by them all. Another person who is showing his interest in the youngsters is Umpire Laporte, who has offered to preside over all the games.
