Playgrounds Are Still Very Live Issue.

The matter of playgrounds was discussed briefly at the meeting of the School Board last night and the feeling seemed to be strong for a school ground. That is the opinion of the Daily News. We would all like to see the Acropolis Hill rock removed and if this can be done, the result will be decidedly beneficial. The ball players and others really need this improvement. We respectfully suggest, however, that the first duty is to the school children and the largest number of these will be served by the improvement of Hays Cove Circle. The chief objection to building the school at Hays Cove was the lack of playgrounds. Now that the school is placed there it is absolutely necessary to provide grounds for the hundreds of children who will attend next fall.

Boards of Trade In Convention.

The annual convention of the Associated Boards of Trade has been dealing with a number of subjects of interest to other than business people. It has passed a number of resolutions, some of which are very interesting. It advocates among other things the establishment of a chair of commerce at the University of B. C. This is an indication that the convention considers commercial life should be a scientific calling on a par with agriculture or mineralogy. The establishment of such a chair would be setting the seal of confidence on commercial life and giving it a standing in the province.

Eberts Fishery Commission.

The Board of Trade convention wants the finding of the Eberts fishery commission made public. The habit of hiding the findings of a commission which is contrary to the views of the Government is not in the best interests of the country. Judge Eberts was in this case appointed to make some investigations regarding the fisheries on Vancouver Island. He took several months of his valuable time making inquiries and then the report is pigeon-holed and access to it is refused the public who paid Judge Eberts for his work, and in whose interest he was supposed to be making the inquiry. There is a fishy odor accompanying such action.

School Trustees and Municipal Councils.

There is often friction between municipal councils and school trustees over the relative rights of each body. The law provides that the school board shall decide what money it requires and that the municipal councils shall find the money. The councils often feel that they are not treated fairly in this matter. They have the odium of levying the taxes while the trustees have the pleasure of spending. In this city there have been strained relations from time to time. If the trustees levied their own tax and people knew exactly that they were paying for the schools, there would be greater satisfaction and in some cases a greater desire on the part of trustees to keep down expenses. We do not think too much has been spent on the schools here. It is rather the other way. Education is one thing that cannot be neglected. At the same time the practical education of a clean town of good roads and of library and other establishments is just as important as the education given in the schools.

HOUSE OPENS AT OTTAWA ON MONDAY

Speech from Throne will be Read in Senate Chamber Again

TARIFF REVISION TO BE DEALT WITH

OTTAWA, Feb. 11.—(Canadian Press)—Parliament opens on Monday with all the pomp and circumstance of pre-war days. Last year, owing to the condition of the Senate Chamber, the House of Commons was utilized for the opening ceremony. This session the Speech from the Throne will be read in the Senate chamber itself, members of the House standing meanwhile at the bar. Since prorogation, much work has been done in the new Parliament buildings. With the exception of furnishings, the Commons chamber has been completed. The temporary ceiling has given place to decorations of gold leaf and blue. The Hall of Fame is in an unfinished condition, with the exception of the end near the library entrance; and in the Senate a good deal of elaborate carving and other decorative work remains to be done. Yet with all the drawbacks of an unfinished building, the ceremony promises to lack nothing in display.

Shuffle of Seats
 The first of the Meighen administration, the session will have features of peculiar interest. Some familiar figures will no longer be in their accustomed places. Sir Robert Borden, who led the House through the years of war, will move from his old place near the head of the table and Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen will occupy the Prime Minister's chair. Hon. N. W. Rowell who sat on Sir Robert's left will also move down the House. Hon. Martin Burrell has left the parliamentary arena and his seat will probably be occupied by Hon. Rupert Wigmore. Rt. Hon. A. L. Sifton has succumbed to the illness from which he suffered so long. Since last session, also, Lieut. Col. McLeod who sat on the Government side and Joseph Gladu who supported the Opposition have passed on to the majority. There will, too, be three new faces—the successful candidates in Yale, B.C., East Elgin and West Peterboro.

Tariff Revision

The tariff revision will be paramount among Government business to be submitted during the session. The Government proposals in this regard are not expected to be drastic. They will be based essentially on the protection and encouragement of home industries; the securing of adequate revenues; development of inter-Imperial trade and of Canadian national resources. Since last session, a committee of Cabinet, headed by Sir Henry Drayton, Minister of Finance, has toured the country and collected evidence. The committee has since been busy in preparing its recommendations for the Cabinet. The Government will eventually make its proposals known to the House in the budget speech.

With the whole tariff thus thrown into the arena, the budget debate may be expected this year to be long and result probably in some close divisions. Throughout the session, in fact, there is likelihood of keen fighting.
