Convention of Boards of Trade Has Busy Session

Dealt with Number of Questions including Hospital li ancing, Town Parning, Unemployment and Railway Directorate

VANCOUVER, February 11 .- The convention of Provincial Boards of Trade went on record yesterday as favoring a provincial grant to wipe out existing deficits on hospitals in British Columbia at the end of 1920 and the enactment of legislation providing for better financing of those institutions.

Other things asked for were:

A readjustment of financial relations between municipal councils and school trustees.

British Columbia representation on the board of directors of the Canadian National Railways. The establishment of a chair of commerce at the University of

British Columbia. Legislation permitting urban and suburban municipalities to

adopt town planning regulations. That the Government reserve all work possible for the winter months, when unemployment is most pronounced, in order to affeviate unemployment conditions.

That the finding of the Eberts fishery commission of inquiry conducted over fifteen months ago in Fishery District 3 be made public by the Federal Government.
