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ANNUAL REPORT OF POLICE CHIEF

Drunkenness Was Much on Increase in 1920—Collections Were \$18,413.50.

According to the annual report of the chief of police for 1920 submitted to the police commission last night there was \$18,413.50 collected by the city police in fines and other revenue during the year. There was a total of 659 cases in the police court resulting in 603 convictions. During the year drunkenness was much on the increase and there were 305 cases as against 147 in 1919. There were 107 cases under the B. C. Prohibition Act, 35 opium and drug cases, 20 cases of theft with 11 convictions, mainly juvenile, one forgery, and 9 charges under the Municipal Act.

For the month of January there were 48 cases, 38 convictions and a total of \$1,249.50 collected in fines. The most serious case was that of theft from the person which is proceeding still. There were 7 cases under the Prohibition Act and 5 cases of common vagrancy. Bread and coal weights were found correct.

HIGH SCHOOL AT KING EDWARD

New Building Will House Lower School Classes After Holidays.

While nothing definite was decided, it was evident from the expressions of opinion, both of the members of the school board and of the principals of the schools, that the high school will be located in the King Edward School after the opening of the new building, the public school classes occupying the Hays Cove building. The matter was informally discussed last night preparatory to the passing of the estimates for the year in order to have the requirements on what buildings would be used.

The domestic science room will also be at Hays Cove and improved paraphernalia will be secured for this department. Miss Marcellus, the domestic science instructor, attended last night to explain what was needed.

PATRICK M'GINNIS CASE IS UP AGAIN

Sworn Statements are Received From Physician and Nurse at Hospital.

The Patrick McGinnis death was further investigated at the police commission meeting last night and sworn statements from Miss Jean Macey, nurse, and Dr. J. P. Gade were received. The Fishermen's Union also had a large amount of information suggesting that the deceased had not been treated in the best manner by the police when he had been picked up. Commissioner Macdonald expressed the opinion that he did not want to see the Fishermen's Union enter into a legal action which would cost them a lot of money and which they were bound to lose. The matter has been left with the mayor with a view to keeping it out of court.
