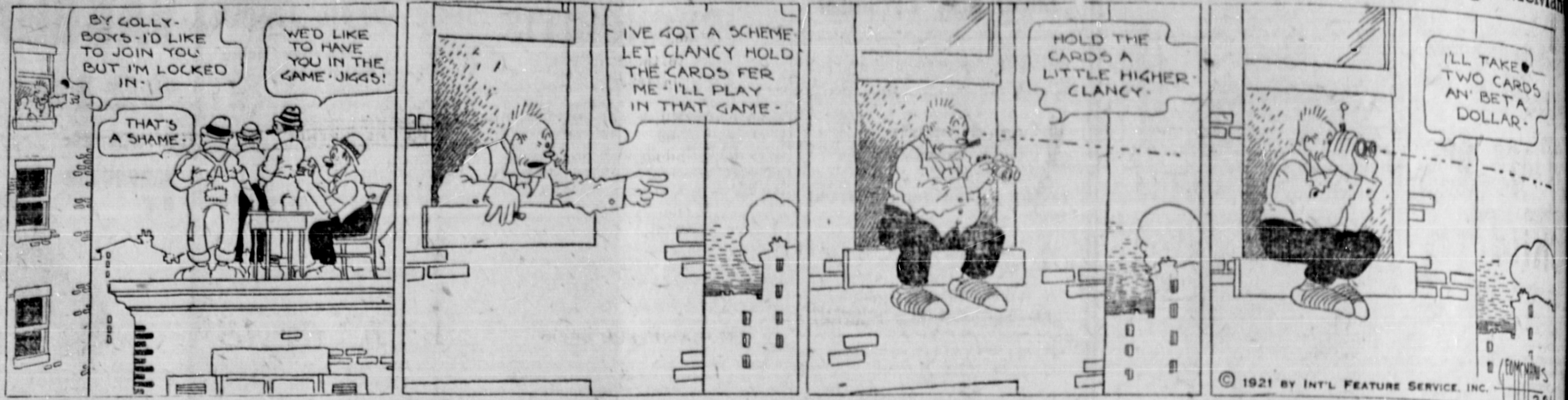

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DWELLINGS SCARCE IN NEW ZEALAND

Lack of Supplies Makes Cost of Building High in That Country

AUCKLAND, New Zealand, Mar. 26.—A shortage of building material is seriously affecting living conditions in New Zealand. Lack of adequate supplies of lumber, cement and builders' hardware is reported to be restricting construction of work in general and especially the erection of suitable homes.

The result is a great scarcity of dwellings and consequent high rents. There appears to be no immediate prospect of relieving the situation.

owing to the scarcity of supplies, contractors in general decline to offer bids for construction work on any other basis than that the owners should pay the cost price plus 10 per cent as contractors' commissions. This has been found unsatisfactory for the reason that it is in the interest of the contractor to make the building cost as much as possible and investors are fighting shy of building propositions, as the uncertainty regarding the probable total cost makes a fair return on the investment doubtful.

At a recent session of the New Zealand Building Congress a resolution was passed and sent to the government urging that customs duties on imported lumber be suspended for a certain period and that the railway rates on foreign lumber be the same as on local lumber. This is the question that has been under discussion for some time.

The McMorde Cup, which is the trophy for the billiard series now going on between the Prince Rupert and Wanderers Clubs, was donated in 1910 by S. P. McMorde for the billiard championship of the Wanderers Club. In 1910 it was first won by Joe Howe, in June 1911 it was won by J. H. Pillsbury and in December 1911 by Ed. Doyle. For many years it has been standing in the Wanderers Club. From present appearances it looks as if it might now go back to the Prince Rupert Club. The fifth of the series of six games for the trophy between the two clubs was played on Saturday. The date for the last has not yet been arranged.

The Moore Shield, the trophy for the bridge championship between the Prince Rupert and Wanderers Clubs, was put up by Captain D. M. Moore in 1910. It is a handsome shield and provision for six series is made on it. It was first won in 1911 by the Prince Rupert Club, but was brought to the Wanderers in 1912 and has since hung in the reading room of that club. The shield will be cherished by the winners not only because it signifies the bridge championship of the city, but on account of its now being a memory to one of the earliest bridge players in the city who gave his life so gallantly when leading his troops with Col. Peck in the early days of the war. Col. Peck and Captain Moore led the first Prince Rupert contingent from the Prince Rupert wharf that fall morning in 1914 to Flanders Fields where the latter fell. Some of the boys whom Don Moore led are now playing in the series for the trophy, among them being Percy Tinker, Bert Wearmouth, H. O. Crewe, Joe Hutchinson and Denny Allen.

PRINCE RUPERT CLUB HAD BILLIARD WIN

Defeated Wanderers in the Fifth McMorde Cup Tournament on Saturday Evening. The Prince Rupert Club was victorious over the Wanderers at billiards on Saturday evening in the fifth of the tournaments for the McMorde Cup. The final score was 1151 to 939, each of the clubs winning three games, the wins of the Prince Rupert club, however, being the most decisive. In the entire series so far the Prince Rupert Club has 5,628 points and the Wanderers 5,110.
