Difficulties
At Shipyard.

Unfortunate difficulties have arisen at the shipyard between the creditors represented by the receiver on the one hand and the Government on the other. It looks as if the Government was taking rather a high-handed stand in regard to it. They are taking advantage of the position in which they are placed and their action, if sustained, will undoubtedly work a hardship on the creditors. With any ordinary debtor, the property would be seized and sold. Why not the same apply here. The Government has no moral claim on the material in the shipyard seeing it has not been paid for. What their legal claim is we do not know.

It is greatly to be desired that a settlement be arrived at and that work may proceed at once. The present indications are not very hopeful, however, unless the Government changes its attitude and is willing to allow that the creditors have some rights in regard to the property.

South Africa is
Safely Safe.

The result of the election in South Africa has been watched here with a great deal of interest and the result, as far as known at present, is very satisfactory. The people as a whole are apparently anxious to remain a part of the British Empire. They have found that under the Union Jack they have better conditions than they could hope or expect if they were an independent republic dependent on their own resources only. Today they have great influence, whereas if they were alone without army or navy they would be without prestige in the world, an insignificant state such as might be found in South America.

Omineca Honored
In Its Member.

The member for Omineca has been appointed speaker of the Legislature, an honored position, which will reflect credit on his constituency. Mr. Manson is well fitted to undertake the duties and his appointment should prove a popular one. None will be more pleased to hear of his success than his friends in Prince Rupert, who look on him as a young man of great political promise capable of rising to any position in the gift of the country.

The time used is Pacific Standard, for the 120th Meridian west.

It is counted from 0 to 24 hours from midnight to midnight.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

Canadian National Management
Has Built Stations, Engine
Sheds and Other Facilities

CO-ORDINATION WORK
IS NOW COMPLETED

In the review of the Canadian National Railways issued for the press it is shown that much progress has been made in improving the service in different parts of the line and in bringing the railway up to standard. During the year the co-ordination scheme with the Grand Trunk has been worked out and construction work is proceeding in a good many parts of the country. In all, 23 branch lines are under construction.

New stations, car sheds and other improvements have been put in on the western lines as follows:

In line with the management's policy of improving existing facilities on Western lines and making timely and prudent provision for the maintenance of the property in the best possible condition, considerable moneys were expended, as follows:

Port Arthur, express building, Prince Arthur hotel—new dining room and alterations to barber shop, etc.

Mission, car repair shop.

Fort Frances, new five-stall engine house, new freight office.

Rainy River, new ash pit.

Hunter, 100 ton coal plant.

Marchand, new station.

Ste. Anne, new station.

Transcona, extension to coach paint shop.

West Yard, Fort Rouge, extension to Battery building; new concrete chimney, 210 feet high, new turntable, rebuilding transfer table foundation-concrete, rebuilding and extending warehouse.

Winnipeg, alterations to express building.

8 section houses on Government line between Winnipeg and Fort William.

Grand Beach, hotel, new bath house, new toilet building, extension to water supply, ice cream plant, fixing up athletic grounds.

Russell, 100 ton coaling plant.

Kamsack, new turntable, new ash pit.
