**Useful Work  
 In Housing.**

The report of the Prince Rupert Housing Ltd. shows that there is a demand here for money for building operations with the very best of security. The fact that a small company like this is able to pay seven per cent interest shows that a larger concern could make even a higher rate of interest without charging borrowers more for their money. The overhead on a large concern is always less than on a small one.

In view of the evident demand for money for legitimate building, there is a good opening here for a financial concern that would do a regular loaning business. The capital of Prince Rupert Housing Ltd. is very small and as a result the field of activity is limited. Either the local concern should be built up, or another company be induced to locate here. Lack of available funds for building is holding the place back.

There are many people here who have money in the bank earning only three per cent. This money could be loaned at eight per cent on safe mortgages and it would at the same time be used in improving the city. Possibly it has never occurred to many that they would be doing a public service by placing building loans. There are many people who wish to erect houses but only occasionally is there money available for mortgages. The demand is much greater than the supply.

**Prince Rupert  
 In Public Eye.**

Prince Rupert is very much in the public eye to the south. Everyone seems interested in the developments here and in the possibilities of the city in the future. The sketch of the new court house here was published recently on the front page of the Victoria Daily Times and caused considerable comment. People to the south had an idea that this was something of a village, but they have had their eyes opened in various ways of late. When the census returns are published everyone will scan them eagerly and the returns from northern British Columbia will certainly attract attention. While the population might have been much larger if the mines had been working, there will be a good showing as it is, especially in the interior agricultural areas.

**Curious Study  
 In Psychology.**

The preparation for the Carpentier-Dempsey fight makes a curious study in psychology. It is a monster advertising stunt with Tex Rickard as the master advertiser. The whole campaign has been carefully planned and not an opportunity has been lost in reminding the people of the continent that a great event is to take place.

And after all, the event is not a very great one. There is to be a boxing match between the representatives of France and the United States, two champion boxers for the world title. It is to be a twelve-round go without any decision. That discourages betting and ordinarily it should have discouraged many from attending. So well has the event been planned and so cleverly advertised, through the newspapers only, that it has become to most people the big event of the year. The Irish question sinks into insignificance before it and the British coal strike is simply an incident. The whole continent is aroused and Saturday's result will be watched by millions of people with the most intense interest.

**FINE RECITAL  
 LAST EVENING**

Miss Lorna Tite and Assistants do Convent Proud in Their Performances..

The pianoforte recital rendered last night at St. Joseph's Academy by Miss Lorna Tite, assisted by Miss Kathleen Grant and Miss Marguerite Young, proved both a delight and a surprise to those who had been fortunate enough to receive invitations. It was delightful on account of the excellence of the program rendered and it is surprising to know that, right here in Prince Rupert, there were youthful artists capable of rendering such a high class form of entertainment. The small music room of the Academy was only capable of seating some seventy-five people, thus necessitating the number of invitations being limited, but the concert that was provided for the privileged few was of a very high order and would have compared favorably with many entertainments given in a regular concert hall in a far larger city. Miss Lorna Tite, displayed a distinct mastery of the piano, truly remarkable in one so young, and all those present could not help but feel that the youthful artist was destined in the near future to win a prominent place in high musical circles. During the progress of the evening's entertainment Miss Tite was presented by one of her fellow pupils with a gold medal given for proficiency in music among the pupils of the Academy by W. F. Harvey, of San Francisco.

Alternating the numbers rendered by Miss Tite, were vocal selections by Miss Kathleen Grant and Miss Marguerite Young. Both these young ladies have excellent voices and showed marked effects from the careful training they have received at the Academy at the hands of the Sister Superior and the other instructors. The rendition of the selected solos and duets they gave, met with unstinted applause from the delighted audience.

After the conclusion of the concert, short addresses were made by Bishop Buzoz, Judge F. McB. Young, Rev. Dr. H. R. Grant and George Tite, M. P. McCaffery and D. W. Morrissey. All these gentlemen spoke along similar lines expressing pleasure and surprise at such a delightful entertainment and witnessing the really remarkable progress that the three young lady artists had made in their studies in music. They voiced the opinion that Prince Rupert had cause to be proud of such an institution as St. Joseph's Academy, which was capable of providing such a wonderful education, both in general subjects and particularly in music. All the speakers dwelt on the debt that the community as a whole owed to the Sister Superior, who coming here some six years ago directly from Toronto, to this pioneer Western town, had been the main factor in providing the truly wonderful and modern educational institution that the city possessed today in St. Joseph's Academy. The ability and skill of the Sisters of St. Joseph's in the training of children and bringing out in them all that was latent and undeveloped was a gift that few people possessed and was more than demonstrated in the performances of the three young musical pupils at the concert given that evening.
