

# Capt. Martin Hansen Believed Drowned As Launch Norah Wrecks

The launch Norah is a complete wreck and her captain, Martin Hansen, is believed to have been drowned as the result of the heavy seas on Sunday morning. Ernest Valpey, the engineer and the other member of the crew, after a narrow escape, arrived in port this morning. The Norah is the property of Captain E. McCoskrie of Prince Rupert.

The launch was returning from Massett on Saturday night, and about midnight ran into heavy seas off Triple Island. The windows in the pilot house were broken in and the engine stopped,
