## The United States' Opportunity for Peace.

With the way cleared by Germany's acceptance of the Supreme Council's reparation program, America now finds it possible to go ahead with a simple peace declaration which will end her technical state of war with Germany. But even that straight cut to the normal, which absolves her of all concern with the national and boundary details of the Versailles Treaty, will not, apparently, secure for her the splendid isolation which she covets. The more frankly she states her views at the council table of the nations the better for world peace and for that reason the presence of her spokesmen again at the meetings of the Supreme Council is more than welcome. Whether she will accept the parts of the Versailles Treaty, which are possible for her, yet remain to be seen. The Harding cabinet's attitude to external affairs is hesitant and ill defined, but the Allies have everything to gain in waiting patiently until such time as it shapes itself.

## English Papers and Irish Question.

English papers say that the Irish situation is gradually going from bad to worse. Far from ceasing, the exchange of abominations between the criminal element in Sinn Fein and the criminals among the British agents in Ireland seems to be going on to fouler and fouler lengths of atrocity. The Manchester Guardian seems to give little more favor to the officers of the government in Ireland than to the Sinn Fein itself. They are criticized for turning Ireland into one immense university of miscellaneous crime. Later, it says, the graduates of this university will be thrown out of employment and flood into England. Then the latter country will feel the effects of its policy whereby soldiers and police are sent to Ireland and given little reason to believe that their type is valued any more than the drunkards, looters, incendiaries and murderers that may happen to be among them. The Manchester paper says that the atrocities committed by the Sinn Fein are nothing more than reprisals for the actions of the military.

## Co-operation Instead Of Rivalry Urged.

Before the Vancouver Board of Trade visitors had had an opportunity of seeing Prince Rupert last night, they declared that, from all they had heard of this city, they were of the opinion that it had a great destiny and that a brilliant future was in store. They seem to think that both Prince Rupert and Vancouver will be great cities and that there should be no rivalry between them. There is room for both of them and each possesses natural assets and resources that neither can take from the other. For the best development of the two cities, it would be best to forget rivalry and, rather, adopt a spirit of co-operation. Both should get together and instead of working against each other should work in unison for British Columbia. In that way each will grow and prosper and natural causes will make a fair division of the great business that may be developed from the fields of the interior, the camps of the coast and the fountains of the ocean.

## NO MORE BEER OR SIGNS OF IT AFTER MIDDLE NEXT WEEK

Government Control Will Then Be in Effect and Bars Will Be Out of Business.

After midnight of June 14 it will be illegal to sell or offer for sale any liquor, beer or near beer or to display signs bearing the words, "bar, bar room, saloon" or any other words signifying the sale of malt or brewed beverages. The officers of the police force were warned of

this at the police commission meeting last night following the reading of a letter from A. M. Johnson, chairman of the liquor control board on the malteries. Chief Vickers stated that his men had already notified all persons and places concerned of this and the proper steps were being taken.

It is expected that after June 15, when government sale of liquor comes into effect, many of the local bars will close their doors permanently as far as their present business is concerned. Mayor Rochester intimated at the meeting that the Hotel Prince Rupert would take this course.

## LLOYD GEORGE AND BIG STRIKE

## Summary of His Attitude on the Situation.

LONDON, June 10.—Following is a summary of Mr. Lloyd George's attitude on the coal strike as prepared by a London newspaper writer and based upon the British Prime Minister's recent speeches on the strike situation.

The first thing is to get rid of the notion that there are huge profits in the mines and that the grasping capitalists are trying to rob the miners of their share.

The mines are not paying because prices tumbled down suddenly.

If the price of home coal were increased the cost of every article would go up.

There is no conspiracy to reduce wages, but the taxpayers cannot be asked to contribute to keep up the wages of one industry.

Government control has done more to destroy the case for nationalization than a million speeches could have done.

The principle of the national pool is a premium on inefficiency. It would mean gigantic army of inspectors.

If we surrender to the threats and starvation and make an imprudent peace, we may be irretrievably damaging the industries of the country.
