A special despatch to the Toronto Star in regard to the McGeough revelations follows:

British Columbia has been shocked by sensational revelations of reckless extravagance, wastage and diversion of unemployment relief funds, contained in charges against the provincial government made to Lieut.-Gov. J.

W. Fordham Johnson by Michael H. McGeough, who for some months represented the Dominion government as director of unemployment BARRISTER elief in this province.

Mr. McGeough told of having checked accounts of the provincial government over a long period. In scores of instances he found the amounts excessive. He discovered that the government had been overcharged repeatedly, apparently for the benefit of intermediaries, and that goods had been purchased in large volume that were not necessary at all.
