The balm of spring pervades the air and the thoughts of all sportsmen are turning to the outside. The basketball schedule has finished just before interest would have died in it and now plans are being made for the summer activity in other branches of sport. Among the absentees will be Clementson and his heavy hitting will be missed by Rupert, but Jimmy Shakespeare, who spent the most of last summer up in the Yukon, is back again and will compensate largely for the loss, because he is a timely hitter as well as a star pitcher. It is uncertain whether Ben Self will be back in time to start the baseball boys off this year, but no doubt, some one else will take up the good work. The younger boys of the city can be seen almost any afternoon now playing "scrub" games on the streets and elsewhere.

Then there is football. That is likely to commence sooner than baseball. It will be remembered that last spring the footballers were out and playing games before the snow left the Acropolis Hill grounds, but so far this year there are no games in sight. There have been some of the players out, though, in more or less impromptu practices. There is just as much good football material in sight this season as there was last and the season, which will open soon, will doubtless be just as successful as last year's when the Old Country game eclipsed the American one in interest and number of games played.
