The Spirit Of Easter.

A great annual festival which has been celebrated with unbroken continuity for over eighteen hundred years is something which cannot be ignored. Observed by people living on every continent, not only in crowded cities but also in remote corners, its psychological effect in producing a wave of inspiring thought which sweeps the world is very great.

The spirit of Easter is the spirit of the fulness of life and the brightness of hope, which rises triumphantly over every obstacle. This spirit is exemplified by analogy in the springtime of nature. The buried seed passes through the gloom of death and bursts forth into the brilliant flower.

The Historic Example.

This spirit of hopeful life received its highest historic revelation in the Person of Christ, whose material body was once crucified on the cross and buried in the tomb, but whose living personality could not be crushed or destroyed by death, but rose triumphantly above every physical limitation, as the influence of His Spirit over the minds of millions today abundantly testifies.

The Practical Meaning.

This spirit of hopeful life is now being manifested in various practical ways by many ordinary men and women, who through the spirit of their personality are rising successfully above their cramping circumstances in their achievement of a noble purpose, organizing victory out of apparent defeat.

The Spiritual Body.

This spirit of hopeful life will find a fuller expression when we make the thrilling discovery that while our body of flesh and blood cannot pass into the kingdom of the spiritual, our soul when united to God through the Living Christ has the power of clothing itself with a new body more ethereal in its nature and therefore better adapted for the environment of a more spiritual sphere.

Personal identity does not lie in material particles but in spiritual personality which thinks and remembers, loves and chooses. The spirit of the fulness of life and the brightness of hope rises victoriously above the decay of the transient flesh and the limitations of the grossly material. The joy of Easter is the joy of a progressive life ever adapting itself to its new environment in a more spiritual body. St. Paul distinctly tells us that "our body which shall be" will not be the same as "our body which now is," though our identity of personality will continue.

The time used is Pacific Standard, for the 12th Meridian west. It is counted from 0 to 24 hours from midnight to midnight.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

SALVATION ARMY ATTACKED NIGHT LIFE OF OLD LONDON TOWN

LONDON, Mar. 26.—Two hundred "picked troops" of the Salvation Army, headed by a brass band, made an attack on London night life recently. The forces gathered in Regent Street shortly before midnight and appeared suddenly in Piccadilly Circus, surprising the crowd in the cafes and other places of amusement.

Without warning the strains of "Shall We Gather at the River" burst up on the ears of the revelers and the cafe devotees. Pedestrian traffic practically stopped while the marchers passed up Shaftesbury Avenue into Leicester Square, thence to Charing Cross.

When the battalion reached Leicester Square, four young women in furs, silk stockings and Piccadilly complexions brought up the rear of the column.

"Things have been in a bad way here for some time past," said Commissioner Cox, who led the attack. "An outcry has come up that nobody is doing anything on behalf of the young women and girls who are found on the streets nightly in greater numbers."

"Why there should be so many mere children on the streets it is difficult to say, but probably the war has had a great deal to do with it. It gave them a taste, not for wickedness, but for 'life' as they understand it. They want too much dancing and pleasure and that very often leads to sorrow."

WAR WIDOWS MARRY AND LOSE PENSIONS

Budget to be Reduced by £10,000,000 This Year Result Pension Reduction

LONDON, Mar. 26.—British war widows are re-marrying so rapidly that the Chancellor, of the Exchequer, Austen Chamberlain, expects to be able to reduce pensions appropriations in this year's budget by £10,000,000 sterling. This, however, is only one of the factors contributed to the anticipated reduction, but it is stated that thousands of women made widows by the war have again become wives and thus automatically taken their names off the pension list. The pensions granted to widows of soldiers who died in active service are withdrawn when the widows re-marry.

FINED FOR KEEPING DOG TIED TO KENNEL

LONDON, Mar. 26.—A banjo manufacturer, of Southwark, was fined at the Tower Bridge police court for cruelty to a dog by keeping it on a chain. He was said to have admitted that the animal had been chained up for 16 years, and had been out only once during that period. Afterwards it was found to be aging and was destroyed with the owner's consent. The magistrate described the offence as sentencing a dog to canine penal servitude.

The license commission had again to deal with the Savoy license application last night. The commissioners object that it is too near a place of worship, the Baptist Church, to be given a license. Charges of illegal selling on Sunday against the Knox Hotel were also heard. Oliver Besner stated that he had instructed his men explicitly not to sell against the law.
