March Across The Rhine Tomorrow

SERIOUS REBELLION IN RUSSIA AGAINST SOVIET RULE; PETROGRAD IN FLAMES

Rebellion Against Russian Soviet Spreading in North

Petrograd in Flames and Troops being Despatched from Moscow to Restore Order; Will Get Friendly Reception

Road Supply is Cut Off for Government Troops

Fifty-five Soviet Commissaries Fly to Estonia; Most Serious Uprising Yet for Present Regime

LONDON, March 7.—News of a most serious character has been received from Petrograd. The residential and business areas are in flames and the Soviet Government is despatching troops from Moscow to Petrograd to restore order.

The rebels plan to accord these troops a friendly reception in hope of winning them over.

In many towns near Petrograd have been captured by rebels. Twenty-five Soviet commissioners having been abandoned by troops have fled to Estonia and 50,000 armed peasants constitute the Government at Tambov and Veronezh, preventing the re-taking of the northern sections of Russia.

The despatches indicate that the Soviet faces the most serious situation it has yet seen.

In Feiners' Mayor Shot In Home as Retrial for Murder of Gen. Cumming

LONDON, March 7.—General Cumming, commander of the Kerry regiment, was one of two officers killed in an ambush of the military at Glanham.

General Cumming was president of a court of inquiry investigating the shooting of railwaymen in Mallow.

One hundred men took part in the ambush and in addition to two officers, two privates were killed.

In Dublin a daring attack on a military lorry with bomb explosions and rifle fire caused a panic in the streets. Two civilians were wounded.

BLINN, March 7.—George Glancy, mayor of Limerick, was shot dead at his home and his wife seriously injured, and Michael O'Brien, former mayor, was killed in his home by bands of men. Sinn Féin is greatly exercised over this latest shooting. The Sinn Féiners believe it is in reprisal for the assassination of General Cumming.

REVOLUTIONARIES TAKING KRONSTADT BEEN CONFIRMED

LONDON, March 7.—Confirmation has been received in Copenhagen of the reports that Russian Revolutionaries have taken possession of the fortress of Kronstadt and the seaport at the head of the Gulf of Finland, near the city of Petrograd.

OLIVER SAYS PATTULLO IS LIVE MEMBER

Member for This District Urges Inclusion of Skeena Road in General Policy.

In connection with the Government policy of road building, as expressed to a delegation, Mr. Pattullo recently took occasion to emphasize the need of including the Prince Rupert to Hazelton road in the program of construction. The Victoria Times report of the incident is as follows:

"The Provincial Government intends to carry out a broad policy of road construction and to press road work at different points in the province as fast as financial conditions will allow. Premier Oliver told delegates from the Good Roads League, who waited upon the Executive Council this morning and presented resolutions passed by the League convention here yesterday.

The Government is impressed with the necessity of road construction throughout the province," the premier assured the delegation. "We realize that if the province is to develop we must not only have better roads, but more roads. The Government intends to follow out a policy of road construction, and to press that work just as far and fast as the financial condition of the province will permit of it being done with reasonable safety."

And the North.

"Including the north of the province," suggested Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands, who pointed out that the resolutions presented made no mention of a road from Prince Rupert to Hazelton.

"It's all part of the province," agreed Mr. Oliver. "They know, anyway, that the north has a live representative on the job here!"

The delegation was introduced to the cabinet by the Hon. J. H. King, minister of public works, who had just concluded an address to the League convention. Mayor Gale, Vancouver, president of the League, was the chief speaker. He congratulated the minister of public works on his neer, against Mrs. Marie Dahlstrom, and efforts to give the province good strom, Drexel Rooms, and Williams & Manson, and remarked, "I hope, Mr. Premier, that the Government will be as kind to Dr. King as possible and let him fulfill his desires as to road building."

Allied Troops Will March into Germany

GERMAN COUNTER PROPOSALS REJECTED BY ALLIED COUNCIL AND ACTIVITIES COMMENCE TOMORROW

LONDON, March 7.—(Latest)—Application of penalties on Germany for non-fulfillment of the reparations requirements was decided upon by the allies this afternoon.

LONDON, March 7.—(a.m.)—The new German proposals are stated in French circles to be unacceptable. They were submitted to the Supreme Council this morning.

The Germans told the allies that Germany had rejected the proposals formulated at Paris. They had decided to revert to the idea of a provisional arrangement calling for the payment of fixed annuities for the first five years and an equivalent of twelve per cent on German exports.

It is reported that the Allies will inform the Germans that penalties will be applied. The situation is said to be serious.

BERLIN, March 6.—After conferences between members of the cabinet, Reichstag leaders and technical advisers, it is authoritatively stated that instructions were sent to Dr. Simonds at London in which he was told the German Government would not permit him to exceed the counter proposals made at the repARATION conference.

LONDON, March 7.—The penalties for non-compliance with allied demands are occupation of Duisberg, Dusseldorf and Ruhr in the German industrial area beyond the Rhine by allied troops.

The imposition by each ally of such tax as he deems fitting on German imports.

The establishment of a customs boundary under allied control along the Rhine.

Lloyd George told the Germans their proposals were unacceptable. They did not even justify the postponement of the penalties. There can be no peace, he said, until the allies get their proposals, which mean a permanent settlement.

The allied troops will march into Germany tomorrow.
