MOTOR BOAT WILL SOON BE NEEDED

Those who have motor boats for sale should advertise them soon as the season is coming when they will be in demand. A few dollars spent in advertising a boat usually brings results, if the price is right.

Advertising is often expensive, but it is nothing like as expensive as an empty store and idle clerks.

FAT AND ITS VALUE

Care used in saving and caring for all fat obtained from cooking meat in the home will save many a dollar which otherwise would have to be spent for butter, lard or other cooking fats. Fat derived from the cooking of broom, ham, chicken, beef and other meats should be kept, each in its own receptacle, to be used for different purposes.

Household specialists in the United States Department of Agriculture say an old-fashioned method of clarifying fat from the soup kettle or from cooked meats, so that it may be used in the kitchen, is to add the cold fat to a liberal quantity of cold water, then pour slowly and let cook for an hour or more. When cold, the cake of fat is removed and the lower portion, which will contain the small particles of meat, should be scraped away and the white, clean fat saved. If the flavor or color, or both are not satisfactory the process may be repeated several times. Another method often recommended is to cook a number of slices of raw potato in the boiling fat.

NEW SHOES FOR OLD.

When brown shoes begin to be rubbed off in places take some brown oil paint (tube paint such as artists use) and rub lightly over worn out places. Only a small bit on a cloth will make the shoes like new, and the oil keeps the leather soft. Do not use turpentine or the leather will stiffen.

HELPFUL HINTS.

Small clothespins are better than large and stay on more securely so that the wind does not blow the clothes away. Twice turned doughnuts are not so greasy as those turned once. Paint on a window glass may be removed by solution of soda. Wheat and oats, and grasses, too, make attractive trimming for hats.

Cleaning Enamel.

Take some warm water and a little kerosene oil, rub over the enamel and wipe dry. It will not harm the enamel.

CARE OF THE EAR.

In the first place, act as if hearing were of more importance than any other thing on earth.

As soon as a child is born one must think about the ear. In placing the baby in bed, care should be taken that its ear is laid close to its head and not bent downward toward the face as it might cause deformity of the auricle. The object of the auricle (outer ear) is to collect the waves of sound.

Avoid all such injuries to the ears as result from slapping, pulling and very loud and sudden noises. Keep out of the external ear all things smaller than the little finger or stiffer than a towel or handkerchief.

In health the deeper parts of the ear can be left to take care of themselves. The orifice of the canal should be cleaned in precisely the same manner as any other portion of the body—that is, with a wet sponge or cloth.

HOUSEWIFE'S ENERGY.

Conserving time and energy is one of the problems of the housekeeper. Time and strength may be saved in two ways; first, by planning one's work carefully, and secondly, by making use of labor-saving equipment. Either of these may make the difference between a tired, overworked housekeeper and one who has some time and energy left for reading and recreation after the day's work is done.

CULINARY KINKS.

Fried oysters on crisp lettuce make delicious sandwich filling. Let potatoes lie in cold water for a little while before paring if you wish them to be white.

To a recipe for graham biscuits add a half cupful of chopped nuts. Good and a nice change. Wash black stockings in fresh suds and rinse in very blue water.
