SAMUSHIRO, Japan, Sept. 24:-The Japanese goodwill Junkers monoplane, essaying a flight across the Pacific Ocean from Tokyo to San Francisco under the auspices of newspaper Hichi Shimbun, hopped off here early today for Nome, Alaska, with the expectation of making the hop in 31 hours. From Nome it is planned to fly to Fairbanks, Alaska, and Hazelton in British Columbia. The plane will fly via Paramushiru, Whitehorse and Seattle but no stops are contemplated at these points although emergency supplies have been laid Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, down at each.
