WORK AT LOCAL SHIPYARD WILL SOON BE DONE

Wallaces Expect to Have Canadian Britisher Out of Their Hands by End of Month.

The trial runs of the new Canadian Government Merchant Marine steamer Canadian Britisher will take place before the end of the month, stated H. J. E. Turney, superintendent of the Wallace Shipyards, this morning. Soon after that the vessel will be turned over to the Canadian Government. The future activities of the local yard seem to be rather uncertain at the present time and the Wallace company is now awaiting reply from the railway company as to the lease. Certain of the foremen engaged on the Canadian Britisher have been given notice that they will not be needed after the end of the month. The notices had been made subject to rearrangement dependent now and then, this being dependent on the continued lease of the plant.

MUST HAVE COWS BEFORE CREAMERY

Hon. E. D. Barrow Tells Victoria People of Visit to Interior.

On his return to Victoria from his visit to the interior of northern British Columbia, Hon. E. D. Barrow said: "At present in the Francois Lake country and south of Burns Lake there are not enough milk cattle to make the establishment of a creamery profitable, as it could not be operated at more than a fraction of its minimum capacity and that would mean extraordinary high costs."

Hon. Mr. Barrow went into all phases of the dairy situation in that country and made a plea for greater co-operation among the cattle men in Central B. C. He has started the department to work to make certain that the Francois Lake people get the best outlet for their cream. This is by way of Burns Lake to the creamery now operating at Vanderhoof, 75 miles along the G. T. P. It was found that it is more profitable for the ranchers to ship to Vanderhoof than to operate a creamery at Francois Lake, until cream production of the district increases to render possible a lower proportionate overhead cost. Hon. Mr. Barrow said that a creamery would be established at Francois Lake as soon as the number of cattle increased.

LARGE PART OF CROP THRESHED IN NORTH

EDMONTON, Oct. 19.—From fifty to eighty per cent of the threshing has been completed in the Peace River country, according to reports received from various northern points by local headquarters of the Edmonton, Dunvegan and British Columbia Railway.

Weather conditions have been exceptionally favorable to progress throughout the week and granaries are rapidly being filled with the products of a bountiful harvest.
