Exhibition Is Public Institution.

The exhibition is a public institution put on by a committee representing the whole city. It is our fair and it is up to us to make it a success. Any measure of success which the directors have been able to attain has been through the co-operation of the people. We cannot look on it as a thing apart from us. It is financed by the city and province jointly and by the individual merchants and others who have dug down into their own pockets in addition to giving their time.

This Year Showing Is Very Creditable.

The showing this year is very creditable. In many respects the exhibit is better than has ever been seen here before. There never before was such a fine display of Indian work as is staged in that section; the photographs are more numerous, and there are other lines that are extremely meritorious. Taken all in all the fair is a good one, and the opening day must have pleased the directors in the matter of attendance.

Much to Learn Every Time.

There is much to learn every time in regard to the staging of exhibits and making general arrangements for the fair. No two seasons are alike and on no two occasions can the attractions be the same. Exhibitors tire of putting in their goods and others take their places. That is always true of every fair everywhere.

Prince Rupert and district is able to produce the goods. That is plainly evident from the vegetables, flowers and grain at the fair. Unfortunately there is no opportunity for some of the districts to get in their goods. There was no steamer from the Islands, hence there was no exhibit, and this year it promised to be an unusually good one. Kitimat is rather badly cut off from this place, although not far away. As we develop these difficulties will be swept away and we shall be represented at the fair by exhibits from every quarter.

Trade Exhibits From Outside.

This is the first year on which we have had trade exhibits from the outside. Two Vancouver firms have gone to a great deal of trouble and expense in getting their goods placed before the people of this section of the country. This is the first year they have done so, and it is to be hoped they will find it profitable. We shall be glad to find ourselves of sufficient importance to attract numerous outside exhibitors in future.

It must be remembered in connection with these annual fairs that the growth of the city is gradual and as it grows so must the fair develop. We must move steadily forward and the fair must be the means of showing the steps in our progress.

Wonderful Flowers Can Be Grown Here.

We all know what splendid vegetables and flowers and fruit can be grown at various points in the district, all the way from Terrace to Prince George. We also know that Queen Charlotte Islands are well suited to agriculture and horticulture. The annual fair, however, indicates that right here in the city we can grow fruit and flowers in abundance and that as the population becomes more settled and the gardens are developed we shall be able to show the outside points what we can do. From a commercial point of view we cannot hope to compete with the Interior, but from a show point of view we can produce just as high class fruit, vegetables and flowers as can be grown anywhere. This is particularly noticeable of the flowers. They are later here than in the South, but they are just as beautiful and just as fragrant, and often less injured by the burning sun and scorching winds.

ANOTHER ORE STRIKE ON ILLIANCE RIVER

High Grade Steel Galena Vein Found on Bellevue Property

Another strike of high grade ore has been made at the Bellevue mine the early part of this week. The ore is a high-grade steel galena and the lead is from 1 to 3 feet in width. It is a new strike and is on the west side of the river, 100 feet above the river level and is on the Blenheim claim. The lead has been traced on the surface for a distance of 300 feet and 5 cross-cuts have already been made on the surface. Mr. A. J. Hughes, who is in charge of operations brought samples of ore from this strike to town, on Thursday, and it is some of the finest ore that has ever come from the Illiance River district. He also brought down samples of copper and galena ore from Glacier View, which was taken from a lead 25 feet wide, also samples of copper glance and brittle silver ore from the Glacier View.

ALEX MANSON OPENED FAIR

Member for Omineca and Speaker of Legislature Addressed Large Gathering Yesterday.

The ninth annual Prince Rupert Exhibition was formally opened yesterday afternoon at Agricultural Hall by Hon. A. M. Manson, speaker of the B. C. Legislature and member for Omineca constituency. The big hall was thronged for the opening ceremony and on the platform with Mr. Manson was President G. H. Monro, of the Northern B. C. Agricultural Association and Directors Harry A. Beck, E. G. Dawson, Harry Love and H. Pattinson. The Greenville Indian Band provided the opening music. Mr. Manson said:

"I deem it an honor, Mr. president, to be asked to formally open this the ninth Exhibition of the N. R. C. A. & L. Association. It is indeed no small matter to organize and carry through an Exhibition such as this. One does not always receive that support from the people of ones territory that such an enterprise deserves. There is always the spirit of 'Let George Do It' and the result so often is that about a dozen Georges have to do it. This is not as it should be because the annual Exhibition is an event of the first importance in a community. It is the means of educating the people of the whole district and of visitors as to what the district can do and as to what it has done.

Lack of Knowledge.

"In a new country such as this our great handicap is that we do not know ourselves. In Canada the east does not know the west. In the Province the south does not know the north, and the coast does not know the interior. So therefore anything we can do to make our resources and our progress better known, not only to ourselves but to a wider circle, will undoubtedly not only bring credit to us but encouragement and material gain. Northern British Columbia has an abundance of natural resources. Little by little she is coming into her own. We are progressing industrially—we are progressing agriculturally and the day is no far distant when this portion of this Province will not only produce the most of what it consumes but be an exporter on a substantial scale.

Promises Well.

"Mr. President the day is auspicious—the exhibits are excellent—this promises to be the greatest and most successful exhibition yet. There is no electric button for me to press—without further ceremony and trusting that this exhibition will redound to the credit of you and your Executive—as I know it will—and be a means of encouraging development and production and that it may be a stepping stone to greater things in future years. I declare this Exhibition formally opened."
