### JUDGES PLEASSED WITH EXHIBITS

The judges, T. M. Anderson and W. James, last night expressed themselves as well pleased with the local exhibition. The vegetables and flowers, particularly pleased Mr. Anderson, not so much on account of any keen competition, but as an evidence of what might be done. He said some of the flowers were really wonderful.  
 Mr. Anderson had one criticism to make and that was what he called the lack of general interest in the exhibit. The exhibits generally were not carefully placed, the owners taking little pains to see that they were shown to best advantage. He thought there should be more civic pride in the exhibition. More pep and enthusiasm on the part of the residents would have a marked effect in making a good fair.  
 Mr. James, who judged the poultry, said very much of it was very good. The prize-winning birds were first-class. He strongly urged that the poultrymen of the city get together and study the business, especially along the lines of adaptation to local conditions. He argued that more enthusiasm be shown.

### FINANCING OF AN EXHIBITION

Sailing Close to Wind This Year Owing to Increased Expenditures.

The financing of the Prince Rupert Exhibition is one of the biggest tasks in connection with the annual event and is one that has to be carefully handled. It is a very easy matter for a fair to show a deficit and with a view to preventing this it is necessary to have a capable committee in charge to allot moneys to the various departments and see that the expenditures do not exceed the revenue. In the nine exhibitions that have so far been held in the city there was only one that did not show a surplus. From present indications it would seem that the 1921 exhibition is sailing close to the wind in this regard but this is on account of the greatly increased number of attractions that have been put on among such as the holding of the aeroplane flights which will cost the association \$950 and the baseball elimination series which will cost well over \$700. These are expenses that in the past have not been incurred.

The annual statement of the Northern B. C. Agricultural Association for the year 1920 shows a total of \$6,596.99 assets in which is included a balance on hand of \$242.47, value of main building, \$4,935.37, poultry house \$523.04, plank roads and furnishings, \$755.11. These property assets of the board will be greatly increased by a number of permanent improvements put in this year including sidewalk booths and the cattle shed. At the beginning of this year the association had no liabilities.

### Revenue Account.

The biggest item in the receipts of the association for each year is generally the cash donations that are collected from the business men and public generally. Last year these amounted to \$3,019.85. Admission fees take second place in the classification of revenue and last year amounted to \$1,537.70. The city makes a grant \$1500 and the provincial government \$500. The federal government gives a grant of \$200 towards the Indian Department. Printing the prize list runs into a good deal of money but this is covered with a surplus by the advertising sold. Rent of grounds and booths and membership figure further down in the revenue list.

### Expenditure.

The largest expenditure in connection with last year's fair was the payment of prize moneys which totalled \$2,049.63. Sports and attractions cost \$1,097.00. The latter will come up closer in value to the former this year if it does not exceed it. Last year the association spent \$1,157.35 on improvements to the building which included the putting on of a new roof. Nearly as much money, if not more, was again been spent on the building this season. The secretary's salary is \$800 and wages at the time of the fair to special help, freight and other smaller expenses further call on the finances.

The total revenue of the Agricultural Association last year was \$9,815.62 with expenditure \$9,573.15 leaving a cash balance of \$242.47. It will be a few weeks after the fair before the standing for this year is ascertained as the revenue from gate receipts will figure largely as to which side of the ledger the balance will be on.

The exhibition finance committee this year comprises F. G. Dawson, (chairman), George Bryant, S. E. Parkers, John McRae, T. W. Silversides, Harry Love and Harry Lipsell.

### FIRE BULL RIVER DESTROYED ALL OF CHINESE SECTION

FERDIE, Sept. 14.—Fire in Bull River destroyed five dwellings, a store and the entire Chinese section of the town. The loss is estimated at \$30,000. It originated in the Chinese restaurant and spread rapidly.

### MINERALS AT EXHIBITION

A. C. Garde, M.E., Has Collection of Materials and Data on Kaizen Island Smelter at Fair.

The feature of the mineral exhibit at the Fair this year is a special display that is being prepared by Mr. A. C. Garde, M.E., and which will be in place this evening. Mr. Garde is assembling a collection of materials and data to illustrate the possibility of the establishment of a smelter on Kaizen Island. These include samples of iron, coal, coke, fluxes and maps. Mr. Garde will be on hand at all times to explain and give information to those who may be interested.

The mineral exhibit this year has been neglected and little interest seems to have been taken in it. With Mr. Garde now taking a hand in it there is something interesting assured. He is an expert and knows the importance of the subject he is to take up.

U.S.K. district is the only outside point that has sent an exhibit this year. There are some good new samples of copper ore from that section.

### VERY GOOD PHOTOS AT FAIR THIS YEAR

Amateurs Did Well in Exhibit But Not Best Work Yet.

The amateur exhibits of photographs at the fair this year was unusually large and more care has been taken in the matter of staging the pictures, although even yet they are not lighted so that they may be seen to advantage in the evening.

There are some very creditable productions, especially in sunsets. On the other hand some of the exhibitors placed on view nothing but a group of ordinary snapshots, poorer even than the ordinary touch-the-button kodaker could have done. There was a lack of exposure such as is usually apparent in snapshot work and little attempt at serious composition or art photographic work.

On the whole, however, the exhibit is encouraging, and doubtless by next year there will be some better results. Time exposures with the use of the tripod should become more popular if the best results are to be obtained, especially in view of the rather heavy foliage of this northern country.

### TRADE EXHIBITS AT THE FAIR

Many Local People Have Stalls for Exhibition of Their Wares.

One of the important features of this as well as other fairs is the exhibit of local industries and of goods marketed in the district. This year there is a furniture display by W. G. Barrie showing a dining room suite, very handsome and attractive. There are other articles of furniture showing the varied business done by this firm.  
 Two automobile showings are made. There is a fine new Chevrolet touring car put in by the Pacific Cartage Co. The machine is up to date in every particular and is very well suited for the local roads. On the other side of the hall is a Ford Sedan and also a truck of the same make, both most useful in this town, the retailers in this case being, Hood & Frizzell.  
 McRae Brothers have their famous Brunswick and Victrola gramophones, which are kept playing a good deal of the time, and also the firm has typewriters, filing cabinets, kodaks, and photographic enlargements.

### INDIANS HAVE FINE EXHIBIT

Splendid Collection of Baskets at Fair is Chief Feature of Season.

### WONDERFUL WORK IN NATIVE HANDICRAFTS

One of the big features of this year's fair is the very fine exhibit of Indian baskets. The largest of these is made by G. C. Perry, Indian Agent for this district, who has gathered together a wonderful lot of fine specimens of Indian work from all parts of the coast from Alaska to Washington. They are set out according to the districts from which they come and give a very fine idea of the artistic handicrafts of the natives. Unfortunately these handicrafts seem destined to become a thing of the past because the younger Indians do not take up the work.

Other Articles.  
 In addition to baskets there are ceremonial totems, paddles, ceremonial masks and garments, all distinctive of the native people of this north coast.

In addition to the basketry and carving, there is some excellent crochet work by members of the Elizabeth Long Memorial Institute at Kitimat and also specimens from Metlakatla and Queen Charlotte Islands, and there would have been many more exhibits if there had been means of transportation.

School Exhibits.  
 The pupils of Miss E. Clippert of Metlakatla Indian school have some very fine exhibits of school work especially unique being the painting on shells and other color work in which the young people excel. Other school exhibits showing much skill come from Essington and Kincolith.

There are specimens of basketry from Port Simpson, Metlakatla, Naas River points, Skidgate, and some wonderful slate carvings from Skidgate.

On the whole the Indian section is excellent and puts to shame many of the other exhibitors.
