Why Not Tourists Stop Off Here?

Now that it seems to be established that tourists are bound to come this way whether they are encouraged or not, it might be wise to consider whether a longer stop-over could be arranged here. Passengers going East have just time to see that the baggage is transferred and to look out for a good seat in the railway car, when the train pulls out. If they had a few hours here they could drive around, purchase a few curios, and get some idea of the city and its surroundings. If the railway company was approached before the next schedne is arranged, it might be possible to have a change. At any rate it would be worth while making the effort.

Another improvement in regard to catering to visitors who come here would be to keep them informed of the movements of the small passenger boats. They do not realize that the salt lake is a very beautiful place to visit and that if it were in some places ? it would be exploited as a tourist attraction.
