WASHINGTON, Dec. 5 .- At the armament conference this morning Britain, Japan and France agreed to retire from much of the leased territory of China contingent upon the fulfilment of conditions, which China is expected to meet.

It is said that the delegates are having important success at the conference. It is believed that an agreement has been reached today at a conference of representatives of Britain, America and Japan on the question of naval ratio. The nature of the decision is held up pending replies from Tokio.
