### ARCTIC IS DESCRIBED

Trading Schooner Chinook Here on way From Herschel to Vancouver

### Life in North

Is Fraught With Adventure and Hardship But Two Trappers Like It

The Arctic is full of life in the summer and would be a wonderful place in which to live were it not for the restrictions against white men which make it difficult, according to "Scotty" McLellan, well known Arctic trapper, who with his partner, Leonard, spent Saturday in Prince Rupert on their way south with a cargo of Arctic fox furs in their schooner Chinook, after being four years in the north.

"Scotty" says he already wants to be getting back north but he wishes the Canadian government would make conditions better there. It seems that most of the country is under a blanket reserve for the use of the Eskimos and Indians in those parts. The law in this respect is strictly enforced by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police. He claims that Alaska natives and half breeds are allowed to come into Canadian territory and trap whereas white Canadians are not allowed to do so. Among the Eskimo half-breeds there is Alex. Stefansson, a son of Vilhjalmur Stefansson, the well known explorer.

According to McLellan's story, the only place they could trap was on the big ice floes. They were not allowed to kill foxes on the islands. They spent most of their time in Coronation Gulf. In summer, the place was teeming with ducks and geese and other wild fowl but they were not allowed to shoot them as they are protected in their breeding places. The natives and half-breeds had no compunctions in this regard and slaughtered the birds wholesale with pump guns, killing thousands and often not using many that they killed.

### He Smiled

Asked what they ate, if they could not use the wild fowl, Scotty smiled and said: "Of course we always obeyed the law. What else could we do? We ate seal meat mostly, especially in winter."

Describing the method of killing the seals, McLellan said they would sight the animals on the ice half a mile away. To get near it was necessary to crawl most of that distance and it was trying work. The natives were too lazy to do it except to get just enough blubber to do them the winter. The moment one shot the seal it was necessary to dash forward and get it before it rolled into the hole close by and was lost beneath the ice.

The Chinook, when coming in from Baillie Island to Herschel brought Napoleon Verville who had been exploring along the coast and discovered a number of new islands. He reported Eskimos on Melville Island and also he told of numerous adventures with wolves which are killing off the caribou in the far north. He found dozens of carcasses of caribou lying on the snow just killed and left there by the ravenous creatures.

Verville, whom he described as one of the finest men in the north and who is now in hospital at Edmonton recovering from badly frozen feet, cut off three of his own toes with a razor in order to save his life. It was a very trying experience but it is of such stuff that the men of the north are made. Verville had fought wolves at different times and had some narrow escapes.

PHILHARMONIC SOCIETY

Following the presentation of four successful concerts during recent years, the Prince Rupert Singers have been permanently organized under the name of "The Philharmonic Society." This society has for its object the promotion of a better appreciation of music, both choral and instrumental, and the raising of money for charitable purposes. In order to do this, it is realized that concerts must be put on at a popular price.

There are many people in this city who, while not being performers themselves, are deeply appreciative of good music. It has, therefore, been decided to create an associate membership in the society. This will enable us to put on concerts at a very low cost and thus make available more money for charity. For the coming season, the Philharmonic Society has pledged the proceeds of all public concerts to the city for relief purposes.

It is planned to hold two public and two private concerts during the 1932-33 season. At these concerts, various types of vocal, choral and instrumental music will be presented. In the private concerts, music of a more unusual character will be attempted.

Associate membership entitles the holder to the following privileges:

(1) One reserved seat at all public concerts.

(2) Two reserved seats at all private concerts.

(3) A request for favorite numbers to be performed by vocalists or the choir, if music is obtainable. These privileges are extended for the reasonable figure of \$2.00 for the season. Associate membership, of necessity, will be strictly limited. The society sincerely hopes that the citizens will join them in this undertaking.
