Harding, of the United States, has written that his proposed visit to the Pacific Coast this year has been cancelled on account of other engagements. The president expressed his gratitude for the invitation.

**Russian Famine**

Formation of Local Relief Committee Under Way Following Meeting Yesterday.

In response to the published announcement in Saturday's papers the attendance to the initial meeting in McIntyre Hall for the above purpose was small, for which the inclement weather was doubtless partly responsible. The chair was occupied by C. M. Smith, who read correspondence from the secretary of the famine relief committee for the drought stricken in Soviet Russia, outlining the terrible conditions and need for speedy relief. A general discussion followed and in order to make the appeal as efficient in results as possible it was decided to first secure the endorsement of as many influential citizens and organizations as possible and then call another meeting at which a really representative committee could be formed and methods of collecting the money decided upon. J. H. Burrough was elected secretary pro tem, and the conveners of the meeting, Messrs. Smith, Rank and McAninch, were appointed the executive committee pro tem. The next meeting is to be held at the call of the executive committee, and as soon as possible.

**CHINESE IS CAUGHT SELLING MORPHINE**

G. Kim, Alias Kam Sang, Was Fined \$500 in Police Court This Morning.

G. Kim, alias Kam Sang, an old Chinese offender under the Drug Act, pleaded guilty to a charge of selling in the police court this morning and was fined \$500 with the option of nine months' imprisonment. The premises of the accused, 814 Third Avenue W., where Kim carries on a business as a tailor, were raided on Saturday by Sergeant McClintch and Constables Poustie and McMeekin and accused was caught in the act of selling morphine, a private detective having been employed.

**Edmonton-Jasper Road to Be Built**

Alberta Premier Promises Support for Proposal to Use Railway Grade.

EDMONTON, Sept. 26.—Asking interest and co-operation of the provincial government in the Jasper Highway proposition, a delegation from the Edmonton Automobile and Good Roads Association waited on Premier Greenfield Thursday morning. The premier promised full consideration of the plan and said that this highway would receive the same assistance as roads in the rest of the province. Before taking any definite stand in the matter, the premier would want to be sure there was a clear title to the road bed, in which at the present several parties, including the Grand Trunk Pacific, the Canadian Northern and the bondholders are interested, and also some adjustment remains to be made with the British government for the rails that were taken from the road bed for use in France during the war.

**DRILLING SIX NEW OIL WELLS**

Fort Norman Lands Being Staked by Imperial Oil Co., Which is Also Buying.

EDMONTON, Sept. 26.—Drilling will be in full swing at six wells at Fort Norman this fall, according to Wada, the Japanese and W. C. Wilson, who is post manager for the Northern Trading Company at Fort Norman, who have just returned from the oil fields in the north. Both are very enthusiastic over the progress being made in the oil fields. Four of these wells are Imperial Oil Company property, while the other two are of the Fort Norman Company and the Mackenzie River Company.

The arrival of the party has exploded the rumor that the Imperial Oil Company has struck another oil gusher on Bear Island. "It is absolutely impossible that the Imperial Oil gang should have struck oil since we left," said Wada. "They had not started boring at the time. We departed from Fort Norman July 25 and they cannot be down more than 100 feet or so at the present time."

The Imperial Oil Company has staked some 16 claims recently giving them 64 square miles, while they are staking still more and buying up every inch of property in the Fort Norman fields.

The Fort Norman Company is drilling on the Nicholson claim six miles from the Imperial No. 1, and about 45 miles from Fort Norman.

The Imperial Oil Company has removed its drilling outfit from Imperial No. 1 and are starting operations with this outfit on the Siman's claim on the opposite side of the river.

**Local Men Work Exporter Wreck**

Services of F. C. Brynolson and E. C. Brand Are Recognized By Percy G. Sills.

The wreck of the Canadian Government Merchant Marine steamer "Canadian Exporter," which went up on Willapa Bar on July 31 and broke in two, was purchased by Percy G. Sills and H. R. McMillan, of the Premier Lumber Co., for \$2,000. Salvage operations have been going on for some time and are now about finished for this year but will be resumed again in spring if the vessel is still afloat then. A good deal of gear and some of the lumber cargo has already been recovered.

Assisting Mr. Sills, who has personally supervised the operations of salvaging, were F. C. Brynolson, of this city, and E. C. Brand, second engineer, who formerly resided here. In a lengthy interview published in the Vancouver Province recently, Mr. Sills speaks very highly of the services of these two men under the arduous conditions which have prevailed throughout the work.

**Music Is Not All Harmony**

MONTREAL, Sept. 26.—Joseph Webber, president of the American Federation of Musicians, has refused permission to the British Revue Company for the admission to Canada of Conductor Culrick on a direct tour of the British Theatrical Company.
